One of the nice things about the media situation in South Dakota these days is that every state basketball tournament game is on TV. That allowed me to take a break from looking at the Class B girls' tournament to watch one of the best-ever girls' players in South Dakota play one of her final games.

Mitchell's Macy Miller has had a phenomenal senior season, averaging over 30 points a game. That's a number that you don't see often at all in the girls' ranks, and especially not in the big-school ranks.

Hurt as a sophomore and overshadowed by a good senior class last year, Miller has more than come into her own this season, helping the Kernels rank second in the state entering this week's AA tourney in Brookings.

But Miller isn't just a scorer. The six-footer is a rebounder, a passer and a defender. She has not

only been a force herself, but she has made those around her better, as any good point guard does. And, yes, Mitchell did set out to give her a couple of opportunities to pad her numbers. In her second meeting with Yankton, she outscored the Gazelles single-handedly for much of the game, then left the game early in the fourth quarter after setting a Kernel single-game record. (She later broke it again, and now has a 'AA' state-record with a 49-point game.)

But most of the time her points are within the flow of the offense, as well as in the transition game.

In my 20-plus years of covering sports in Yankton, I've gotten to see some very good girls' players on the court: Beginning with Yankton's own Jenni Larson, Wagner's Mandy Koupal and Crofton's Amber Hegge stand out at the top of the list. And while she is not from our coverage area, she has been extremely fun to watch.

Now that Yankton will no longer have to face her on the court, I'd suggest that area fans take a moment to watch Miller — either during the state tournament or when she heads to South Dakota State next fall.

Selected and voted on by member coaches of the NABC, these student-athletes represent the finest basketball players across America. The 252 student-athletes, from 25 districts, are eligible for the NABC Coaches' Division I All-America teams.

A Rock Valley, Iowa native, Dykstra averages an even 16 points per game, and leads The Summit League with 7.7 rebounds per game and with nine double-doubles.

In addition to the NABC honors, Dykstra also earned All-Summit League first team honors, Capital One Academic All-American honors and is one

of 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award.

"Matt was one of the most successful coaches in program history despite having to work through a Division I reclassification process," athletic director David Herbster said in a statement.

"His work helped lift the Coyote program to where it is today and we are better off for having him here."

Houk guided USD to a 19-13 last season, including the program's first-ever trip to the Summit League Tournament — where the Coyotes lost in the semifinals.

"There are some fond memories there, not even just volleyball wise," Houk said. "The community has been great to our family. I'm very proud of what we did; I think we put the program in a really good position."

The program will lose three seniors (Tori Kroll, Amber Aschoff, Natalie Walseth) from last season, but will bring a solid core to compete this fall in the Summit League.

Chief among those returners is Kendall Krittenbrink, a 5-foot-10 Gretna, Neb. who will be a senior this fall. She earned Summit League Player of the Year honors after leading the conference in kills (557).

The idea of Williamson leading the program during the interim phase was welcome news to the players,

Krittenbrink said Thursday. "That was my biggest fear with the whole thing," she said. "Being my senior year, it's a little scary to see a new coach come in and change everything."

That said, Krittenbrink is in favor of Williamson getting consideration.

"I hope she gets the job; I'm really pulling for her," Krittenbrink said. "Her and I have built a bond. That's the hardest thing with coach leaving, he and I were really close too. But I'm happy for him."

Though USD announced a national coaching search would begin immediately, Williamson made no secret of her interest in the job on a permanent basis.

"The administration knows I'm interested, we talked about that briefly this week," she said. "I'm definitely excited about this opportunity right now."

"I wouldn't want them rushing anything. I hope they take a serious look at me, but either way, I'll be happy for this program."

The working relationship Houk and Williamson had is perhaps proof that she could potentially take over the program without any hiccups, Houk said.

"She recruited every one of those kids, so they all have a great relationship with her," Houk said. "They would know what to expect from her, but at the same time, she could put her own spin on the program."

Houk, meanwhile, will join a perennially-strong Gopher program that has made five consecutive trips to the Sweet 16.

Minnesota and USD are scheduled to face each other potentially twice during the spring season, Krittenbrink said — once in Minneapolis and possibly another time at Northern Iowa.

"Hopefully he doesn't give away too many of our secrets," Krittenbrink joked.
