

Essay Contest Entries Due By March 28

PIERRE — South Dakota Ag in the Classroom (SDAC) and South Dakota Farm Families (SDFF) are partnering together to host an essay contest for third- and fourth-grade students across South Dakota.

The topic for this year's essay contest is "The Surprising Places I Found Agriculture." The winning student will receive a classroom pizza party hosted by SDFF, a visit from a local ag producer and a certificate. The winning essay will be published on SDAC and SDFF websites and Facebook pages.

"By having to do some research before writing, youth are enlightened as to just how many times each day they experience some aspect of agriculture, even if they don't live on a farm," states Ann Price, executive director for SDAC.

"South Dakota dairy and hog farmers have been visiting classrooms as a part of SDFF's 'National Ag Week' activities for seven years now. The essay contest gives each school the opportunity to take part in the National Ag Week activities," adds Rebecca Christman, outreach director for SDFF.

Any third- or fourth-grade student in South Dakota can enter.

"Entire classrooms can submit essays. The more students from a single classroom who enter, the greater the chances that room will be having pizza for lunch one day," states Christman.

Price adds, "This contest was designed to meet the Common Core standards for writing, so teachers can use this as a practice activity before the DSTEP tests. Teachers can refer to the entry blank on the website to see what standards are being met."

Entries are due March 28, with the winner announced on the SDAC and SDFF Facebook pages April 15.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for May delivery rose 13.50 cents to \$6.8725 a bushel; May corn was 1 cent higher at 4.86 a bushel; May oats rose 3.75 cents to \$4.4375 a bushel; while May soybeans declined 7.75 cents to \$13.8850 a bushel.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

April live cattle rose 1.63 cents to \$1.4525 a pound; May feeder cattle was 1.30 cents higher at \$1.7830 a pound; while April lean hogs rose .38 cent to \$1.1930 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stocks ended lower Friday as investors braced for a critical vote this weekend over the future of Ukraine's Crimea peninsula.

The region is holding a vote on Sunday, which is widely expected to back splitting off from Ukraine. The U.S. and Europe have warned Russia of consequences if it moves to seize the region.

Through much of Friday, the major stock indexes drifted between small gains and losses.
