





Some of the priority measures are effectively dead for the year, including a proposal to repeal Nebraska's motorcycle helmet law and income-tax cuts championed by Gov. Dave Heineman.

Speaker of the Legislature Greg Adams said he's aiming for lawmakers to debate every priority bill this year that has moved out of committee. Lawmakers are expected to stay in session later into the evening, starting this week.

cerns about moving down this path," Darla Pollman Rodgers of Wellmark Blue Cross and Blue Shield said at the hearing. "It would be problematic if this bill was changed on the floor, and there would be no option for further input."

Bordevyck agreed. A vehicle bill "misses that opportunity for public input," he said.

"I'm very comfortable, regardless of the outcome, that we'll have dealt with what I perceive to be the priorities of the priorities," Adams said. "I want to make sure we've covered the biggest issues. We will have dealt with one or two bills on prison reform, several different tax bills, Medicaid expansion, and at some point, we will have debated water issues."

Lawmakers on Tuesday will begin the 44th day of their 60-day session, which ends on April 17.

Here are some of the bills that have made it to the full Legislature for debate, but haven't yet reached a vote.

— Medicaid: Lawmakers

are expected to start debate Tuesday afternoon on a proposal that would expand Medicaid coverage as part of the federal health care law. The "Wellness in Nebraska Act" has been rewritten after a different Medicaid bill died last year.

The new version makes use of private insurance, cost-sharing and wellness incentives, with the federal government initially covering all of the costs. The federal contribution would ratchet down gradually until it reaches a floor of 90 percent by 2020. The bill will face another filibuster from conservatives in the Legislature, with debate expected to continue

through Wednesday.

The bill, LB887, advanced out of the Health and Human Services Committee on a 5-1 vote, with Sen. Bob Krist of Omaha abstaining.

— Minimum Wage: Sen. Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha and 13 co-sponsors are pushing for an increase in Nebraska's minimum wage. The bill advanced out of the Legislature's Business and Labor Committee last month on a 6-1 vote.

The bill, LB943, would gradually increase the state's minimum wage from \$7.25 per hour to \$9 per hour by 2017. It also would gradually increase the wage for tip-earners to 70 percent of the regular minimum wage.

Foundation, said South Dakota isn't the only state to use such a technique.

"In California there's concern over spot bills, which are essentially the same thing," Shaw said. "They're problematic."

Rep. Stace Nelson has vocally opposed empty bills in the House and filed formal protests against their passage.

"They deprive the public of the House committee process," said the Fulton Republican. "They're telling these legislators to vote for an empty bill to find out what they're going to put in it in the future. Who thinks that is an

appropriate form of government?"

Rave said it's better to use an empty bill than to replace a fully formed bill with unrelated legislation. And he said bills get debated on the chamber floors and sometimes in conference committees as the differing versions are reconciled.

The bill that turned into the autism task force proposal was discussed in a conference committee, with representatives from the governor's office and the health care industry present. But no members of the public testified and the hearing wasn't broadcast

or recorded as other hearings are.

Conference committees are announced with often less than a day's notice.

House Minority Leader Bernie Hunhoff takes a pragmatic view of vehicle bills. The Yankton Democrat, who often supports open government measures, said they could be used for ill, but they're not.

"Usually vehicle bills are laying out there because there's an uncertainty about the dollar amount or we're waiting for some information," Hunhoff said. "Usually they're well intentioned."

If the relative acidity in an area is too high, it tends to degrade the cell structure of the tooth, Christianson said. To address this problem, he suggested the functionalization of silk floss as a pH indicator to expose areas of concern, as well as deliver binding molecules to help with remineralization.

As a result, the research

group found multiple pH-sensitive dyes that could work with floss, and also discovered some potential solutions for the first step in remineralization.

"In the laboratory, David has demonstrated the ability to perform sound scientific research," said Grigoriy Sereda, associate professor of chemistry, in a news release. Sereda serves as Christianson's mentor and supervises his undergraduate research in the field of materials chemistry. "Perhaps more importantly, David has the ability to think abstractly and offer potential so-

lutions to conceptual problems."

Sereda will accompany Christianson to Washington for the Posters on the Hill event, which will take place April 28-29. The two will serve as advocates for science and education in South Dakota as they meet with lawmakers. Students also will be given an opportunity to share personal stories and their discoveries with members of Congress and professional scientists.

Christianson said that, along with sharing his research with those who are present, he hopes to promote

his state as a vital contributor to the field of scientific research.

"I would like to underscore the notion that there's good science going on in South Dakota," he said. "Ultimately, I would like this place to become more of a hub for medicine and science, and I'm interested in any way I can play a role in that."
