

# **Randolph Boys Claim Nebraska D1 Title**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nolan Nordhues scored 20 points, Garrett Watters had 14 and Randolph held Overton scoreless over a 7 1/2minute span of the second half in a 54-42 victory in the Class D1 boys basketball championship game on Saturday

Creighton Ryan's two free throws with 6:53 left in the third quarter gave Overton its last lead. Overton didn't score again until 7:23 remained in the game, and by then Randolph was up by eight points.

Randolph converted Overton's 17 turnovers into 16 points and held Overton to 29-percent shooting.

Joel Shafer led Overton with 14 points, and Caleb Ecklund grabbed 10 rebounds.

Randolph won its second state championship, and first since 2002.

Overton, which posted upsets over Nebraska City Lourdes and de-

fending champion Howells-Dodge in the first two rounds, fell short of

Kenneth Appleton had 12 points, Nicholas Sjuts 11 and Drew Zitek 10 as the Panthers won their first state title.

Peters made four of the Panthers' 11 3-pointers, and Bancroft-Rosalie scored 21 points off High Plains' 15 turnovers.

Logan Fleming scored a game-high 16 points on 7-of-10 shooting, and Cole Klingsporn added 14 points and Dylan Shenk had 10 for High Plains. The Panthers erased a nine-point deficit to lead

30-23 at halftime. Bancroft-Rosalie avenged a loss to High Plains in the district finals.

## Wait Almost Over For USD Women: NCAA Brackets Announced Today

The wait is almost over for the University of South Dakota women's basketball team.

Six days after winning their first Summit League crown, the Coyotes will find out their date, location and opponent for the NCAA Tournament, when the brackets are announced tonight (Monday) at 6 p.m. on ESPN.

Understandably, the waiting has been hard on head coach Amy Williams and her players.

"I'm a planner, and a preparation

freak," Williams joked Sunday. "So I like to know things as soon as I can."

Depending on the projected bracket you look at, USD (19-13) is likely to earn a 14 or 15 seed into the 64-team field

The up-to-date bracket by ESPN guru Charlie Creme has consistently slotted the Coyotes as a No. 15 seed plaving No. 2 Louisville in Ames, lowa. The College Sports Madness bracket, meanwhile, has USD as a No. 14 seed playing No. 3 Nebraska in Seattle, Wash.

With so many possibilities and projections, the best course of action for the Coyotes is to just wait and see, Williams said.
