Track & Field: USD Women Finish **10th In NCAA Meet**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - South Dakota's Megan Glisar finished fourth in the high jump with a height of 6 feet, 0 1/2 inches while the South Dakota women's track and field team placed in a tie for 10th in the team standings at the NCAA Division I Indoor Track and Field Championships on Saturday at the Albuquerque Convention Center.

Glisar placed fourth on attempts after being one of five athletes to not clear 6-1 1/2. She missed on her first two attempts at 5-11 1/4. Glisar's finish rounded out a weekend that saw pole vaulters Emily Grove and Bethany Firsick place second and fourth respectively on Friday night.

Leontia Kallenou of Georgia won the high jump by being the only competitor to clear 6-1 1/2.

"For Emily, Bethany and Megan to record top-five finishes this weekend is a reflection of their hard work and the hard work of everyone associated with USD track and field," South Dakota head women's track and field coach Lucky Huber said. "To place 10th as a team at this meet is another milestone for our program and really shows how far our team has come in a few short years.

South Dakota tallied 18 points in team standings, tying Mississippi State for 10th out of 58 teams that scored. It's the highest finish by USD since the Division I transition. Oregon won the championship with 44 points while Texas placed second with 43.5 points.

"This is a team effort by all Coyotes to put us in a position to be the 10th best Division I team in the nation," USD Athletic Director David Herbster said. "These performances and the performance of other student-athletes are indicative of the values and work ethic instilled by the coaching staff.

South Dakota will begin the outdoor season on Friday at the Tulsa Duals.
