Bison Pull Off Upset Of Sooners

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Lawrence Alexander hit a 3pointer with 11 seconds left to force overtime and freshman Carlin Dupree scored four points in the final 75 seconds as No. 12 seed North Dakota State knocked off Oklahoma 80-

75 Thursday night.
The Bison (26-6) picked up their first NCAA tournament win by rallying in the final minute and then outlasting the No. 5 seed Sooners in overtime. Alexander finished with a career-high 28 points, but it'll be his falling-down, fist-pumping celebration after the tying 3-pointer that will be replayed in Fargo for years.

Dupree came on in the closing seconds of overtime after Taylor Braun fouled out. He hit two free throws and scored on a difficult baseline leaner with 41 seconds left.

HARVARD, 61, CINCINNATI 57

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) - Siyani Chambers scored 11 points, including five straight in the final 2 minutes, and 12th-seeded Harvard won its second NCAA tournament game in history, upsetting fifth-seeded Cincinnati 61-

57 on Thursday in the East Regional. Wesley Saunders led the Crimson (27-4) with 12 points as Harvard pulled off an upset for the second straight year. Last year, Harvard upset New Mexico as a 14 seed.

The Crimson became the first Ivy League school with NCAA tournament wins in consecutive years since Princeton in 1983-84.

Harvard never trailed after the opening moments. They played with confidence and scrap against the Bearcats, who shared the Americar Athletic Conference regular season

Sean Kilpatrick led Cincinnati (27-7) with 18 points, but the Bearcats failed to win a tournament game for the second straight year.

MICHIGAN ST. 93, DELAWARE 78

SPOKANE, Wash, (AP) Adreian Payne scored a career-high 41 points to get Michigan State off to a solid start in the NCAA tournament.

Payne, a 6-foot-10 senior, scored 12 straight points in the first half to help the fourth-seeded Spartans (27-8) to an 18-point lead.

He set an NCAA tournament record by making all 17 of his free throws and broke the program's tournament scoring record, set previously by Greg Kelser in 1979.

Devon Saddler had 21 points and Davon Usher added 20 for the 13thseeded Blue Hens (25-10).

JVC Gets Past Centerville

ABERDEEN — The stars shined Thursday in Aberdeen, but more importantly especially for James Valley Christian, so did the role players.

Top-seeded JVČ defeated stubborn eighth-seeded Centerville 85-68 in the opening round of the State B boys' basketball tournament. The Vikings (23-1) will play Potter County (22-2) at 6 tonight in the State B semifinals at Wachs

JVC got standout games from 6-foot-4 senior Nathan Wedel with 34 points and from 6-foot-5 senior Andrew Ulvestad with 17 points, 11 rebounds and six assists. But it was the 17 points from Alex Waldner, the seven points, five steals and three assists from Tim Wager, the eight points, four assists and two steals from Cole Glanzer and the defense of Alex's younger brother Jayden Waldner that rowed the Vikings into semifinal waters.

"Our team can have a different leading scorer every night," Ulvestad said. "We trust anyone to do anything for this team. Scoring, rebounding, assists, steals, my teammates can do it all. And that is really awesome to see.'

In the first three quarters, JVC built double-figure leads only to see Centerville rally. JVC coach Darwin Hofer said he team didn't keep up its intensity, but credited Centerville as well. "We got a little complacent at times," he said. "They were able to pick up on that and make a run. This is the state tournament, and teams are not going to quit on you, especially a good team like Centerville."

After Wedel banked a 25-foot three-pointer in right befor half, he and Glanzer opened the third quarter with baskets to expand JVC's lead to 49-34. In the next five minutes, Centerville used baskets by five different players to twice cut JVC's lead to six points, including the last time at 56-50 with more than 10 minutes left in the game.

"Then we got a timeout and made some adjustments," Hofer said. "And after that, we were able to keep our focus and play a good quarter and a half of solid basketball." Wedel also made an important buzzer-beating three-

She later made a layup, a free throw and another threepointer as SDSU took a 35-27 lead with 59 seconds remaining in the first half. Senior guard Steph Paluch then gave the Jackrabbits a 38-27 lead when she sank a half-court three-pointer that beat the

The win extends the Jackrabbits' home win streak

to 18 games, dating to last season. SDSU will play Creighton, which defeated Missouri, 77-51, at 2 p.m. Sunday at Frost Arena in the WNIT's second round. Creighton defeated the Jackrabbits, 68-63, Nov. 12 in Omaha.
