# **Report: Obama To Give Up NSA's Phone Call Sweep**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Security Agency may be getting out of the business of sweeping up and storing vast amounts of data on peo-

ple's phone calls. The Obama administration this week is expected to propose that Congress overhaul the electronic surveillance program by having phone companies hold onto the call records as they do now, according to a government official briefed on the proposal. The New York *Times* first reported the details of the proposal Monday night. The official spoke on condition

of anonymity because the official was not authorized to discuss the plan. The White House proposal

would end the government's practice of sweeping up the phone records of millions of Americans and holding onto those records for five years so the numbers can be searched for national security reasons. Instead, the White House is expected to propose that the records be kept for 18 months, as the phone companies are already required to do by federal regulation.

In January, President Barack Obama tasked his administration with coming up with an alternative to the current counterterrorism program. Obama also said that the option of having the phone companies hold the records posed problems.

"This will not be simple," Obama said. An independent review panel suggested that the practice of the government collecting the phone records be replaced by a third party or the phone companies holding the records, and the government would access them as needed.

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"Both of these options pose difficult problems," Obama said in January. "Relying solely on the records of multiple providers, for example, could require companies to alter their procedures in ways that raise new privacy concerns."

ment, and even surpassed Gov. Daugaard's recommendation of a 3 percent raise, he said.

"We only had to do a 1.6 percent increase for the schools, and we more than doubled that," Hunhoff said. "It's not enough to fix the problem, but it does suggest that we all agree that there is a problem.

He added that the Legislature also approved a one-time \$200 bonus for South Dakota teachers. The gesture is a positive one, he said, but the state still has a long way to go with competitive teaching salaries.

We have to do a lot better," Hunhoff said. "For the seven-state region, we're still \$8,700 below the average. That's concerning, because many of our school districts, like Yankton, sit close to the border. We're at great risk to losing teachers to districts right across the border.'

Turning to a more positive note, Stevens and Sen. Jean Hunhoff (R-Yankton) said they were pleased to see more attention given to technical schools. The state approved new funding for tuition support, buildings, maintenance, programming and marketing.

Forum moderator Dr. Benno Wymar named Estonia and Latvia as two countries that have Russians accounting for more than a quarter of their respective populations statistic he said causes worry over possible Russian invasion. Professor emeritus Dr. Don Pryce pointed out that in tak-ing over Crimea, Russia has taken a "money loser" that costs Ukraine approximately \$400 million a year to subsi-Pryce said Putin wanted Crimea so he could start a customs union that can be kept going with large subsidies. "Ukraine is desperately poor in many ways," Pryce said. "Crimea is poor. Where do the Russians have to go? We think of Putin as being powerful. In effect, Putin is a cornered rat because NATO has been growing on his western borders, and if his actions do anything, (they) give NATO a renewed sense of purpose.

"I think that says that we are starting to see the turn,' Sen. Hunhoff said. "We really need more people in (those careers). Those are basic needs out there, and we need to prepare individuals to take care of

Stevens said technical schools are providing an avenue to address the worker shortage seen in South Dakota, but they also are providing great opportunities for the students.

"All of our parents want our students to be brain surgeons, but some of the bestpaying jobs are with kids going up to Mitchell or Southeast Tech and learning how to do them in two years," he said. "And they're not coming out with \$100,000 in college debt, and they're being employed right away

Sen. Hunhoff also commended the effort of Yankton's manufacturers, which have stepped up to assist technical schools in areas where the state has been unable to do so. Many businesses have contributed materials and machinerv to the Regional Technical Education Center for educational purposes, she said.

'Yankton has really been a model for the rest of the state, because we haven't gone to the state's general fund for dollars," she said. "We've recognized a need and have worked on those partnerships.

'We used the money for structural gear, which we use primarily for house fires," the fire chief said. "It includes the boots, pants, coats, gloves and Nomex, which protects the ears and hair.'

Firefighting outfits are expensive but need to be replaced as needed to meet certification and safety requirements set by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), Schenk said.

"It costs \$2,400 just to pur-

serves a large area and also sees a large amount of traffic because of SD Highway 46 running through the area, Schenk said.

'We go 13 miles west from Irene, one mile beyond the Highway 81-46 intersection, he said. "We have responded to a number of accidents. We respond to all Signal 1 (injury) accidents.
