 • Development of ore beds in South Dakota as a result of a Missouri River survey from Sioux City to Chamberlain is seen by John D. Forsyth of Niobrara, Neb., as the greatest supply of manganese in the world lies along the river for more than 100 miles above Chamberlain and might be developed with cheap water transportation. Further up the river near Mobridge, is coal, chalk and silica.
 • The first preliminary meetings to be held in anticipation of the arrival here of Robert A. Jakoubek, head of life saving and first aid in this district of the American Red Cross who will put on a two week course of intensive first aid instruction, was held last night.
