As a small-town sports editor, there are always those stories that you know will one day come, but never look forward to them. Today, I had to write one of those stories, about Doug Pesicka stepping down as Yankton head girls' basketball coach.

Pesicka has been one of the constants I have had throughout my career. His first season at the helm, 1992, was my first fall with the *Press & Dakotan*. His 1996 title team was the first state team championship I covered as sports editor. He was also the only Yankton head coach that remained from when I first started my career.

No matter how bad things got, you could count on Pesicka not "taking it out" on the media, whether it be me or one of the young people who I had working for me. He may not have always had a lot to say — though typically he did — but he was always patient and polite with my staff and I.

The same could be said of his players. When you talked to a Gazelle, you knew they would typi-

cally be well-spoken and well-mannered. Every once in a while, they'd even test your vocabulary, something that happened more than once when the Storm girls came through his program.

Beyond that, Pesicka was one of the first — if not THE first — coach that I would consider a good friend. We were always capable of having a good conversation without either of us slipping into our coach-reporter roles.

We also understood the importance that family played in each other's lives. That was evident as we talked Tuesday for the story on his resignation, and we had to reschedule for later in the day because of a family issue on my part. When we reconnected and I thanked him for the delay, he reminded me that I had done the same for him more than once over the years.

Pesicka's teams won a lot of games over the years — exactly 300 between 22 years with the Gazelles, one year with the Bucks and two years in Estelline — but that is far from the defining statistic of his legacy. What defines that legacy is the number of young adults who have made the world better because of what he taught them over the years, and the other lives he's touched along the way. Including mine.

Stanford Regional

PENN STATE 83, FLORIDA 61: STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) — Maggie Lucas and Dara Taylor each scored 22 points to send Penn State into the Sweet 16 with a win over Florida.

The third-seeded Lady Lions (24-7) will play at No. 2 Stanford (30-3) on Sunday.

Lucas, the two-time Big Ten player of the year, surpassed the 2,500 career-point milestone and led the Lady Lions to the NCAA tournament regional semifinal for the second time in three seasons.

Ariel Edwards added 16 points for Penn State. The Lady Lions are in the Sweet 16 for the 13th time.

Kayla Lewis led the 11th-seeded Gators (20-13) with 20 points and nine rebounds. Jattera Bonds scored 14.

NORTH CAROLINA 62, MICHIGAN STATE 53: CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Freshman Diamond DeShields had 24 points and a season-high 12 rebounds to help North Carolina beat Michigan State.

Fellow rookie Allisha Gray added 10 points for the fourth-seeded Tar Heels (26-9), who led by nine at halftime then dominated the opening minutes of the second half to turn the game into a rout. North Carolina ran off 14 straight points to blow the game open, with DeShields scoring twice during that flurry to build a 57-31 lead with 11 1/2 minutes left that allowed the Tar Heels to coast to the Stanford Regional's round of 16.

The Tar Heels pressured the fifth-seeded Spartans (23-10) and turned the game into the up-and-down pace they wanted. They finished with a 17-4 edge in fast-break points and 15 points off turnovers in a huge improvement from their first-round struggles against UT Martin.

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for 15 years, dating back to Mors' time as an assistant at Huron.

"I had a lot of respect for him," Mors said of Pesicka. "His teams always were well-coached and played hard."

Finding Pesicka's replacement, Mors said, will be a challenge.

"We want to find someone knowledgeable, and we're looking for a good person," Mors said. "Doug was the epitome of that."

Pesicka, an Elk Point native, is a graduate of Mount Marty College and was a 2004 inductee into its athletic Hall of Fame. He plans to continue teaching, as well as working with the sixth grade girls' basketball and middle school
