and three-time AL MVP Alex Rodriguez, who is suspended for the entire 2014 season. "Obviously, that showed

that there was a need for harsher and stiffer penalties – and this is a very clear and resounding answer for all of that," Los Angeles Dodgers catcher A.J. Ellis said.

Detroit shortstop Jhonny Peralta and Texas outfielder Nelson Cruz returned from their 50-game suspensions in time to participate in last fall's playoffs. Peralta became a free agent and was given a \$53 million, four-year contract by St. Louis during the offseason.

"In the past it hasn't been

"Football is like English," he says. "We speak one language with a lot different dialects. Sometimes it's like we are all speaking a different language.
