'Guarantee' Comes True For Bees

Bloomfield Beats Omaha Nation For First State Berth Since 2006 BY JEREMY HOECK jeremy.hoeck@yankton.net

NORFOLK, Neb. - A preseason guarantee, though it may have been in a somewhat joking manner, came true for the Bloomfield Bees.

Before the season, the boys' basketball players told head coach Gary Eisenhauer that they were going to state this season.

His response?

"He said, 'Let's do it,'" said senior Conner Wilson, who scored 17 points in Bloomfield's 60-40 win Tuesday night over Omaha Nation in the District D1-3 final in Norfolk.

And so, for the first since 2006, Bloomfield qualifies for the Nebraska State Tournament, to be held March 12-14 in Lincoln.

"It's perfect," Wilson said. "We've been talking about this forever."

Bloomfield (17-8) needed a late surge down the stretch this season to reach this point. The Bees, once 3-7, have won 14 of their last 15 games and upset defending state champion Randolph in sub-districts.

"It's huge. It's been a long time for us," said senior Cody Beckmann, who scored 15 points.

This class has dreamed of this since fourth grade."

That dream was never really in jeopardy on Tuesday against Omaha Nation, a small, fast-paced team.

Bloomfield rolled to a 30-16 halftime lead and never let that cushion get to within single digits.

Quinn O'Brien, one of eight seniors on the roster, added 10 points for the Bees, who were 11-of-18 at the free throw line.

Amidst the post-game celebration, Eisenhauer — in his second year back with Bloomfield — couldn't put into words what it means for his program to reach the state tournament.

'We don't know yet," he said, with a smile. That's been our goal all year," he added. "We knew we

Huskies Edge Dakota Valley For Return Trip To State 'A'

VERMILLION - On Feb. 6, the Dakota Valley Panthers edged the Elk Point-Jefferson Huskies 75-73 in tripleovertime.

Tuesday night's 4A Region Championship rematch with a bid to next week's State A Tournament in Watertown was decided in regulation but was no less wild as the Huskies avenged the loss to the Panthers with the 50-49 win at the Vermillion High School gym.

"It's exactly how championship games should go," Dakota Valley head coach Tammy Lilly said.

The Huskies' Payton Donnelly swished a pair of free throws with 10.3 seconds left to give EP-J the win and a return ticket to the State A's.

The Panthers bid to win the game on a last-second lay-up, but the shot by Emma Tuttle rolled off the rim.

"It was right there," Lilly said of Tuttle's shot. "It's exactly the opportunity you want right there.

"I went up there thinking it was just like every other day because we are always shooting free throws; I was just trying to block out the crowd noise," Donnelly said of her Region-winning moment. "I have the coaches to thank for always making us shoot free throws.'

'We knew the free throws would be important," EP-J head coach Gary Nebelsick said. "We knew it would slow them down and keep us going if we could get to the line."

McKenzie Mennenga was 8-8 from the free-throw line and led all scorers with 24 points as she helped the Huskies recover from a 10-point 2nd-half deficit.

The Panthers led 31-21 after Abby Faldmo drained a 3-pointer with 6:10 remaining in the third quarter.

Mennenga began the 3rd-quarter charge with a pull-up jumper and later kicked out to Donnelly for an open trey. Donnelly dropped in a 3-pointer with 1:09 left in the frame to give the Huskies

a 36-34 lead. The Panthers battled back to tie the game at 45-all after Anne McCabe backed in for a bucket.

Dakota Valley took a lead at 49-47 as Claire Johnson drove the Huskies' defense for a lay-up.

Donnelly was 3-4 from the line in the final 44.5 to account for the game's deciding points. The junior guard finished with 17 points.

The Huskies were 14-16 for the game hand and a 7-2 lead as Mennenga scored on a drive and later swished a 3-pointer.

Mennenga's jumper late in the first quarter gave EP-J a 13-6 lead, but Dakota Valley's Haley Hoffman sliced the Huskie defense for a foul-drawing hoop and a free-throw make, trimming EP-J's lead to 13-11.

The Huskies ended the first frame with a 15-13 lead as Faldmo pulled for a 15-foot jumper.

The Panthers took their first lead of the night at 18-17 midway through the second quarter when Johnson tickled the net with a 3-pointer. Dakota Valley's lead grew to 22-17 as McCabe scored on a runner.

The Huskies' offense made just two field goals in the second quarter and Dakota Valley held a 24-19 halftime lead as McCabe scored from the lane as time was about to expire.

Proving the doubters wrong became the rallying cry for the Huskies as they put together a 19-win season.

"It's amazing," Donnelly said of returning to the state tournament. "I think some people thought we couldn't do it because we lost a lot of amazing players, but we never doubted ourselves and we have so much heart.'
