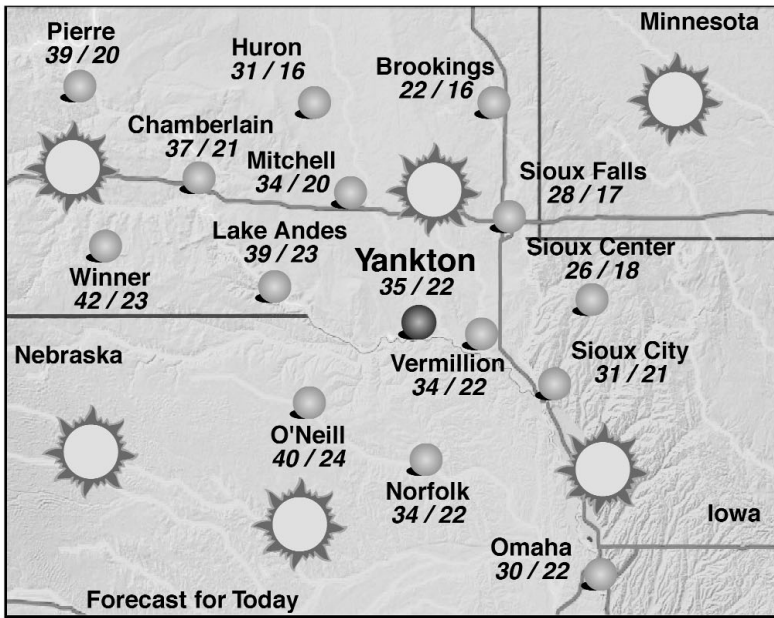

Struck To Be 2015 Miss Shamrock

SIOUX FALLS — Emily Struck, who grew up in Yankton and now teaches in the Hamlin School District in Hayti, will be the 2015 Miss Shamrock and participate in the 36th annual St. Patrick's Day Parade in Sioux Falls on Saturday, March 14, the Sioux Falls Irish Club has announced.

Betty Ordal, recently retired director of membership services for the Sioux Falls Area Chamber of Commerce and a native of the Irish community of Montrose, will be grand marshal of the parade. She's also an aunt of Struck. Struck is the daughter of Paul and Nan Struck of Yankton, both of whom have Irish heritage.

The parade provides an excellent opportunity for people throughout the Sioux Falls region to visit the city for a day of family activities. Events are officially kicked off at 11:45 a.m. with the traditional Painting of the Shamrock at 9th Street and N. Phillips Avenue. The parade forms at 5th Street and N. Main Avenue at 12:30 p.m. and the officially begins at 2 p.m. The route is south on Main Ave. to 13th Street, west to Phillips Avenue and then north to 8th Street.

"My Irish heritage has instilled in me the importance of serving others," Struck told the Irish Club selection committee, "and the mindset that life is about surrounding yourself with the love given by family, friends and those who find life's greatest blessing as both."

Struck teaches Spanish to students in middle and high school in Hamlin County. She will be crowned as Miss Shamrock at a ballads of Ireland concert at the Orpheum Theater at 2 p.m. on Sunday, March 8. The concert is sponsored by the Sioux Falls Irish Club.

There is no entry fee to participate in the parade but each entry must have some kind of Irish theme.

Physics Bowl Registration Announced

BROOKINGS — Fledgling physicists will have the opportunity to test their knowledge in the fast-paced and exciting environment of Physics Bowl XLI. The competition will be held April 24 at the Swiftel Center in Brookings in conjunction with the annual Engineering Expo sponsored by the Jerome J. Lohr College of Engineering.

Only the first 18 schools, each allowed one team composed of no more than three high school students, will be accepted into the competition. Participants are encouraged to register early.

Entrants in Physics Bowl XLI can expect questions and

scenarios that test their knowledge of thermodynamics, basic mechanics, optics, famous physicists and more. In addition to earning a plaque for their school, members of the top five scoring teams will walk away with cash prizes. In order to be eligible for Physics Bowl XLI, participants must be currently enrolled in or have completed a physics course at the school they represent in the competition.

"SDSU's Physics Bowl is about helping students understand how physics plays a role in their lives and how science works," said Larry Browning, physics professor

at SDSU. "The physics department faculty members are constantly seeking new ways to illustrate familiar concepts and create or find mini-experiments to confirm those ideas. Whenever possible, students are given materials and equipment that they can take with them to investigate on their own. Although it is a lot of work, it is also a lot of fun for the physics department and the schools that participate. Everyone wins."

Vermillion Book Club To Discuss ‘Wild’ By Strayed

VERMILLION — The Community Support Book Club presents a discussion of "Wild" by Cheryl Strayed at the Edith B. Siegrist Vermillion Public Library, 18 Church St., at 3 p.m. March 8.

A powerful, blazingly honest memoir: the story of an 1,100-mile solo hike that broke down a young woman reeling from catastrophe — and built her back up again.

At 22, Cheryl Strayed thought she had lost everything. In the wake of her

mother's death, her family scattered and her own marriage was soon destroyed. Four years later, with nothing more to lose, she made the most impulsive decision of her life: to hike the Pacific Crest Trail from the Mojave Desert through California and Oregon to Washington State — and to do it alone. She had no experience as a long-distance hiker, and the trail was little more than "an idea, vague and outlandish and full of promise." But it was a promise of

piecing back together a life that had come undone.

A limited number of copies of "Wild" are available for checkout at the Circulation Desk. Once you are finished with the book, you are asked to return it so others may have a chance to read it before the discussion.
