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For a group of girls who have never won a region championship as a consolidated team, Viborg-Hurley went home feeling accomplished Thursday night after their win against the Freeman Flyers.

'We're elated," said head Viborg-Hurley head coach Bill Hansen following the win. These girls have put in a lot of work, especially over the summer, and it takes dedication to get this far."

District 10B champions Viborg-Hurley claimed a 56-33 win Thursday night at the Summit Activities Center over District 9B champions Freeman, sending the Cougars to the

The Viborg girls have been playing together since we were in fourth grade, and so have the Hurley girls," said senior forward Angie Lee. "But since the consolidation we've all been playing together since eighth grade, and I truly believe we're a family who came

together for this."

Viborg-Hurley jumped to an early 8-4 lead by the end of the first quarter, only allowing Freeman to come within four points the entire first half. The Cougars closed out the first half ahead 16-10.

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LINCOLN, Neb. — Another trip to the capital city, another convincing win on the state's biggest stage for Wynot.

And step one toward a fifth consecutive championship.

Spurred by 21 points from sophomore Cortney Arkfeld, the Blue Devils beat Hampton 66-48 in Class D2 first round action Thursday night at the Nebraska State Girls' Basketball Tournament in Lincoln.

Wynot (21-5), the No. 2 seed in its class, advances to today's (Friday) 3:45 p.m. championship game agasinst third-seeded Sandhills-Thedford.

The biggest advantage for the Blue Devils in the first round? Defensive pressure. Or, put another way, a similar story.

The biggest drama of the first half came when Hampton got within 15-13 at the five minute mark of the second quarter.

Eight straight points by the Blue Devils — and an aggressive defense — enabled them to eventually take a 30-17 cushion into halftime.

Wynot then ballooned that lead to 54-32 after three quar-

Senior Jenna Heine added 13 junior Danielle Wieseler scored 11 and sophomore Carissa Kuchta had nine.

Hampton ends it season at 20-5 after making its first state tournament appearance since 1990.

Wynot, meanwhile, is one more win away from its sixth straight championship game it lost in the 2010 final before winning the next four.

Ponca, which will graduate just two seniors, got 12 points from Kianna Kramper, and five points apiece from Hannah Albrecht and Abigail VanDyke.

By the time that 41-6 run for Crofton was over, reserves were out on the floor for the Lady Warriors and the clock was running because of the big margin.

"Our kids continued to play extremely hard through the first 16 minutes, and that wears on teams, Losing said.

Crofton's bid for a fourth consecutive state title continues into Friday's 7 p.m. semifinal game against either Yutan or Guardian Angels Central Catholic.

"It's reassuring, knowing you're staying here Friday and Saturday, which is a great feeling," Wragge said.

"It's just one step at a time, that's what we're doing."


