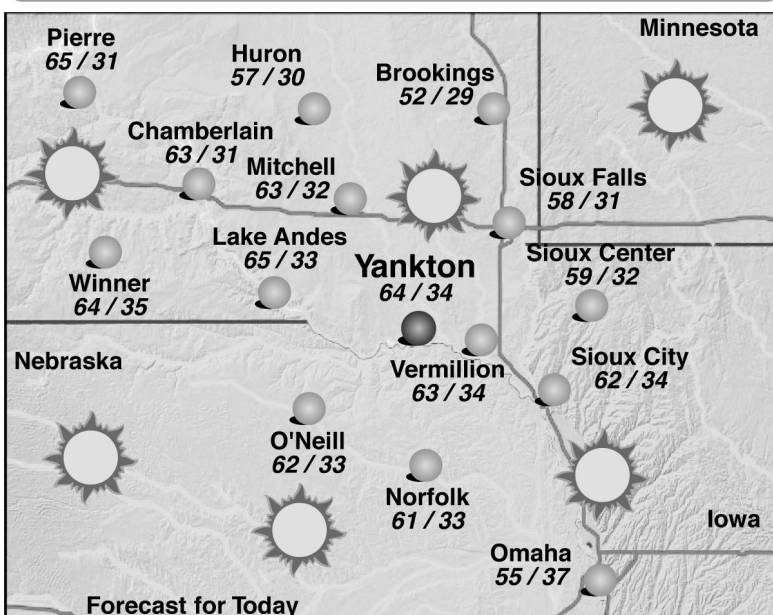

Skrym To Present Lecture, Performances

VERMILLION — University of South Dakota Professor of Music and accomplished pianist Dr. Susanne Skrym will present lecture recitals featuring Russian composer Sergei Prokofiev's Eighth Sonata for Piano in Sioux Falls on March 11, and in Vermillion on March 19.

The March 11 Sioux Falls performance will be at 8 p.m. at Kresge Hall on the campus of Augustana College. The March 19 performance will be 8 p.m. in Colton Recital Hall at the Warren M. Lee Center for Fine Arts, on the campus of the University of South Dakota, in Vermillion.

Each program is titled "Prokofiev's

program is free and open to the public.

Prokofiev's eighth sonata refers to the horrors of the World War II, victory over the Nazis, and Prokofiev's beginning relationship with the woman who would become his second wife. It has been hailed as a masterwork of twenti-

eth century keyboard literature, and it is recognized as Prokofiev's greatest contribution to the sonata genre.

Dr. Susanne Skrym has appeared as a piano soloist and collaborative artist throughout the United States and Europe. Her book, "Anthology of Eighteenth-Century Spanish Keyboard Music," was published in 2010. She has studied with master teacher Ilonka Deckers-Küszler in Milan, Italy, for a number of years, and has been on the faculty of the University of South Dakota since 1988, where she teaches studio and class piano and piano literature.

ting, youth would be taken away from those jobs," Rep. Hunhoff said. "If you were looking at an employer that was going to pay between the \$8.50 and the \$7.50 that they were looking at on continuing, those youth would probably not be the ones getting the job. In my viewpoint, in the discussion and in the testimony that was provided, I was concerned that they would not even be able to get those jobs. We can all be open on philosophies about how a youth has the same skill set as an adult that was coming in there, but I was concerned about seeing jobs taken away from our young people."

EDUCATION

When asked what was being done to support and fund education in South Dakota, Sen. Hunhoff said, "Not enough."

"We have a week left and there are still some measures out there that are going to affect education funding — first and foremost on the overall general budget," Hunhoff said. "Monday night, we are going to get the revenue projection, and then we are going to have a better idea of where we are going to be at with the existing revenue."

According to Jean Hunhoff, the projection is not going to be as great as everyone has thought.

"You remember when the governor put forth his

budget in December?" Rep. Hunhoff asked. "We were looking at fiscal year '15, which is this current year that we had about \$26 million extra. We are seeing ... with some early returns that we will have a soft economy. And right now, we are down to having about \$12 million (or surplus) instead of that \$26 million. So, there are going to have to be some reductions there. As we look in the future for Fiscal Year '16, with the outlook right now, things aren't looking so rosy."

Sen. Hunhoff said that South Dakota's best hope is the governor's Blue Ribbon Task Force.

Daugaard says the task force will "re-evaluate the current funding formula" that has been in place for the last 20 years.

"(The) Blue Ribbon Task Force that is going to be appointed to study problems and what to do about it," Sen. Hunhoff. "Sometimes when you tell groups that, they either laugh at that or cry at it — they not sure what to do. But let's be optimistic and hopefully the Blue Ribbon Task Force will do something."

Sen. Hunhoff said that the situation for South Dakota education is not good.

"Here in Yankton, we are still operating a very good school system, but if you look at the funding, we have got a crisis right down the road," he said. "Rapid City has a very serious situation. All school districts, even the ones who pay the best, are saying that they are having a hard time retaining teachers. The Legislature has almost

been just sitting on its hands here for January, February and now into March. It is the wrong thing."

But Stevens disagreed.

"I don't think I agree that the Legislature is sitting on its hands at it relates to education," he said. "The reason I say that is because we are in a situation, (since) the time I have been in Legislature, where we don't have any new revenue or influx of money that we have had in the past. Remember last year? We had all that unclaimed property money, and it kind of gave the Legislature a chance to do something with it. But what we have been taking our time talking about is how we are going to make up for some loss of revenue for Fiscal Year '15 as well as looking in the future at Fiscal Year '16. Programs are funded, and now that you look at it, there will be less funds. It is pretty hard to do something else without cutting other programs."

TRANSPORTATION

When asked about the status on transportation initiatives for tax increases,

Stevens said he believes something would get done.

"The State Affairs Committee that I am on will be meeting on Monday (today) to discuss the highway bill and pass something to be discussed," he said. "Really, there are two or three plans that have been floating around. There is quite a bit of consensus that something is going to be done."

Stevens said that the main issue is dealing with the fuel tax.

In his budget proposal, Gov. Daugaard proposed \$50 million in transportation repairs to be paid with by fuel taxes, fees and assessments.

"(It) seems to be the biggest area where there is the most disagreement on," he said "The House's plan, I expect, is going to be two cents for three years. And the Senate is a lot longer period of time, and I think the governor wants 16 cents."

Rep. Hunhoff said she hopes to get somewhere near that \$50 million proposal.
