

Uniform Display Set For USD

RAPID CITY — A Women's History Month military uniform exhibit will tour several state university campuses in March to celebrate the contributions of women in the U.S. Armed Forces. The South Dakota National Guard is partnering with the SDNG Museum and the Reserve Officer Training Corps and Veterans Services offices of Black Hills State University, South Dakota School of Mines & Technology, University of South Dakota and South Dakota State University to host the exhibit. From March 16-20, the exhibit will be

displayed at the University of South Dakota's Muenster University Center in Vermillion. Hours are 7 a.m.-6 p.m. The traveling display will feature time-period uniform displays of women of various uniformed services. Visitors to the free exhibit will see descriptions of the garments and the women who wore them. Members of the SDNG will also be available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. every day during the exhibit to speak about the service of women in the military and career opportunities for those who may want to serve.

"The uniform exhibit is a great way to recognize and honor the history of women who have served and are currently serving in our military," said exhibit coordinator 1st Lt. Carstin Jerzak, SDNG equal employment manager. "Additionally, it's a great way for those who may be interested in serving in the National Guard to learn about the career opportunities and benefits of being associated with a professional, dependable, high-skilled and elite organization that represents the best of South Dakota and the nation."

the shifts. I told him that is absolutely not a problem that we are going to have here in Yankton. We have a culture in this community of all coming together and supporting large projects like this."

Wenande said whether it is Riverboat Days, Ribfest or when the flooding happened in 2011, the community pulls together.

"I expect that this will be no different," she said.

Wenande said that there is a job for everyone at the tournament.

"All the shifts are set up by date," Wenande said. "It lists every job description that we have at the time. Air-conditioned, non-air conditioned, sitting, standing lifting — whatever it might be. You can see if that fits in what you are interested in doing."

"At this point, we have over 700 available shifts, and we will be adding more to that as the time goes on and as new things are scheduled."

She said most of the jobs listed don't require the volunteer to know anything about archery.

"If you have a friendly personality and smile on your face, you can do the job," she

said. "We don't want people to be intimidated because it is an archery tournament."

"We can block a whole bunch of shifts off in the morning for that group of people," Wenande said. "Groups like Ability Learning Services have reached out to us and said that they wanted to have some people work some volunteer shifts. I said 'That's great!' Because they already have a group of clients that come out and shoot, so they are already familiar with the complex."

According to Wenande, volunteers will be exposed to cultures that many people may have never experienced before.

"What I think is really important about this event is that we can't make it happen without the communities support," Wenande said. "It is really important for the community to realize that this event is just one of many events that can grow out of this. This is a really big deal for Yankton, considering it only comes to North America once every six years. We are representing the entire United States with this event."

Those who have looked at the site and are unable to find a volunteer shift that fits their schedule are encouraged to check back every week because more jobs will be added to the list as the event gets closer.

one of the biggest issues of the session. Daugaard said he hopes the House and Senate can agree on a plan that can secure the two-thirds vote required to raise revenue.

"Time will tell whether that will happen," Daugaard said. "It's not something I can make the odds on very well, but I'm hopeful."

AUTISM

The House is expected to vote on a proposal to help ensure insurance coverage for a key type of behavioral health therapy that's effective at treating autism spectrum disorder. Parents of children with autism successfully pushed in committee an expansion in the scope of a bill that would mandate coverage for intensive behavioral treatments for autism in certain insurance plans. The measure would apply to about 30 percent of health plans in the state, Republican Rep. Scott Munsterman, its House sponsor, has said.

A change to the proposal increases the payments available for children through age of 6 by thousands of dollars

and expands coverage to hands-on providers, which significantly increases the number of providers included.

Representatives from insurance companies supported the original bill but pushed back against the expanded version. Gosch anticipates efforts on the House floor to restrict the bill.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

The other proposal Daugaard has his eye on is a measure to overhaul the juvenile justice system. The measure, which is also expected to be heard on the House floor, aims to shift juvenile offenders toward community-based treatments and significantly decrease the number committed to the Department of Corrections. The Senate has already passed the plan.

Daugaard's general counsel, Jim Seward, has said the plan would reduce South Dakota's startlingly high rate of adolescents in state-sponsored care. It's a pillar of Daugaard's policy agenda for the 2015 session and builds on 2013 reforms to the adult corrections system.

"As they say, 'it ain't over till it's over,' but at the same time I'm very hopeful (the bill) will find strong support in the full House," Daugaard said.
