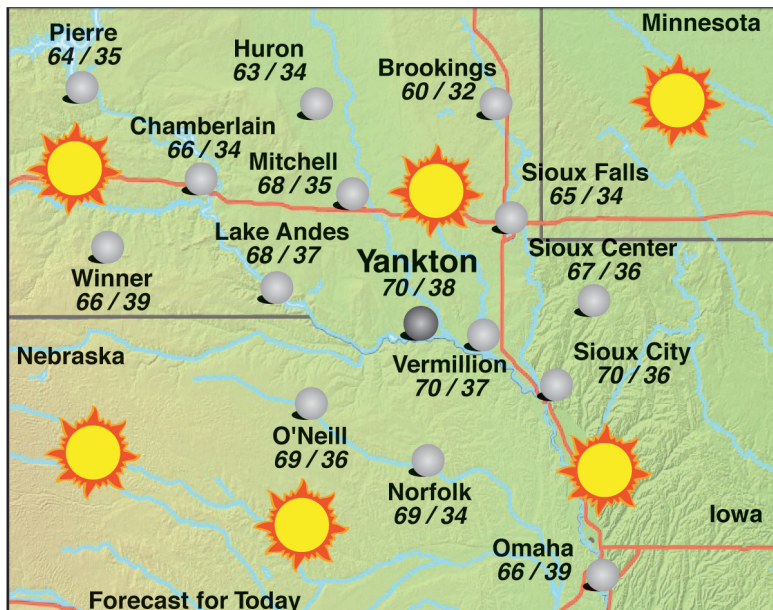

the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. April live cattle was off .65 cent to \$1.5400 a pound; May feeder cattle fell .38 cent to \$2.0707 a pound; while April lean hogs were .05 cent lower at \$.6607 a pound.
