that the outlook is "not optimistic" for the agricultural economy, he said.

"We're just trying to take it as cautiously optimistic as we can," Cronin said.

But Democrats on the committee, who voted against adopting the estimates, said that Republicans were being too cautious and that the lawmakers should choose a rosier number. Rep. Ray Ring, D-Vermillion, said the committee was too focused on bad news over the last few months. He told Republicans to expect more future growth.

Rep. Dan Dryden, R-Rapid City, downplayed reservations about being too cautious.

"If we're too conservative in our projection, that money will be available a year from now," he said.

Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Action (BGEPA).

"It says our buffer zone has to be 660 feet between the nest and construction activities," he said. "We are actually at .44 miles. So we are beyond that buffer zone."

Though the construction work is far enough away from the nest, the USFWS strongly encouraged the city to set up a monitoring program to be sure the project was not interfering with the nesting, Goodmanson said.

University of South Dakota (USD) graduate students Gretchen Newberry and T.J. Agin have been observing the nest and reporting to the USFWS on any impact the project has on the birds.

"We did light monitoring," he said. "At first we noticed they would sit in the tree but they weren't sitting on the nest or anything"

But on Friday, March 6, a eagle started sitting in the nest.

"The budget is \$1 million, and the easy part to figure is the expense because those are more fixed — knowing what it's going to cost per athlete, per coach, per person to be here," he said. "We know what their food is going to be, their hotel is going to be, their transportation is going. Those are the big expenses."

"But the problem we have is looking at the income side. We know what they pay, and unfortunately, what they pay is dictated to us by World Archery and that pretty much covers the shooting end of things and they cover their basic expenses to get here. The problem we have are the support staff, the venue costs, the equipment we use and all the little things that add up."

Robert Romero, director of centers for the Easton Sports Development Foundation, told the *Press & Dakotan* that Yankton holds a distinct advantage that will help cut back on the financial loss incurred by Easton in Ogden 2009.

"At the time, that was not done at an archery center — that was done on some fields that were rented from Weber State University," Romero said. "The biggest impact was that the Easton Foundation paid a lot of money to rent all those properties, where Yankton doesn't have to do that."

He added that support from outside entities is also greater than what was seen in Utah.

"In Yankton, there's involvement from the Governor's Office of Economic Development all the way down to the parks and recreation program," he said.

"You've got state, county, city, universities and everybody's involved in Yankton, which

was not the case in Ogden so much, where we had to pay for everything. There was not near the community involvement."

Stephanie Moser, Yankton Convention & Visitor's Bureau director, said the city also has a transportation advantage.

"Transportation was a huge issue for them," Moser said. "Ogden, Utah, is so much more spread out than Yankton is and they just didn't account for that. ... Even if they're staying out at the lake, it's still a 10-minute drive to get to the archery center. In Utah, it was taking a half hour to 45 minutes."

Cull said the NFAA is taking steps to help alleviate any shortfall.

"The challenge we have is, how can we make up for that shortfall?" he said. "Some of the things that we're doing that we're starting to implement now is our fundraising, which is, in turn, trying to advertise to all the businesses in the area — the people that are hopefully going to reap the harvest from this — and ask for them to give a little back through sponsorships, through buying ads in our program, through donations and everything along those lines."

Cull said fundraising is in the initial stages, but there's already been a \$75,000 donation from First Dakota National Bank.

**A FRUITFUL EXPERIENCE**

Rich Koski, director of sales with the Ogden-Weber Convention and Visitors Bureau who worked closely with the event in 2009, told the *Press & Dakotan* that hosting the event was a positive experience for the region.

"We enjoyed having the group here — there were 62 countries and 440 athletes and it turned out to be a very great event," Koski said. "It was fun to work with the organizers, the kids themselves and it was the forerunner for a relationship with World Archery."

professional judgment to determine normal eagle behavior such as foraging times and male and female incubation switch. The biologists will compare the normal behavior to the behavior resulting from agitation and distress. Distress signs include distress calls, flushing from the nest, alert posture, vocalizing and raising their wings.

If monitoring observations indicate two days of sustained agitation or distress due to construction activities, HDR will request that construction stops until coordination is conducted with the USFWS. HDR will confer with the City of Yankton, SDFWS and the South Dakota Fish and Parks (SDGFP) to determine the appropriate response to minimize the impact to the eagles' nest as well as the projects budget and schedule.

Goodmanson said he hopes the project will continue because it is a need for the City of Yankton.

Also in regards to the project, Goodmanson is asking people walking near Paddewheel Point to stay away from the construction.

"When they are using a crane to clam-bucket material out, on one said the conductor is completely blind," he said. "He can't see. It is dangerous to have people walking through here."

According to Goodmanson, the estimated end date for the project is next summer.
