The letter looked official and the check looked authentic. The receiver of the letter however wasn't sure about its authenticity. For starters, it had her parents address on the envelope and was postmarked and stamped from a Hispanic country south of the border. The letter was slightly bigger than a standard 8x10 sheet of paper com-monly used in southern countries. An Internet search confirmed that it was a scam to gain access to your bank-ing information. The website is very authentic looking also. If you receive letters with checks

always verify whether it is real or not before you cash the check or give out information on the internet. If you receive a phone call from someone stating you've won something but you have to pay a fee to receive your winnings be hesitant. Never give out social security numbers, bank numbers, date of births or any other in-formation that may identify you to people you don't know.

Always remember, if it's to good to be true, it's a scam no matter if they say you won money or want to
