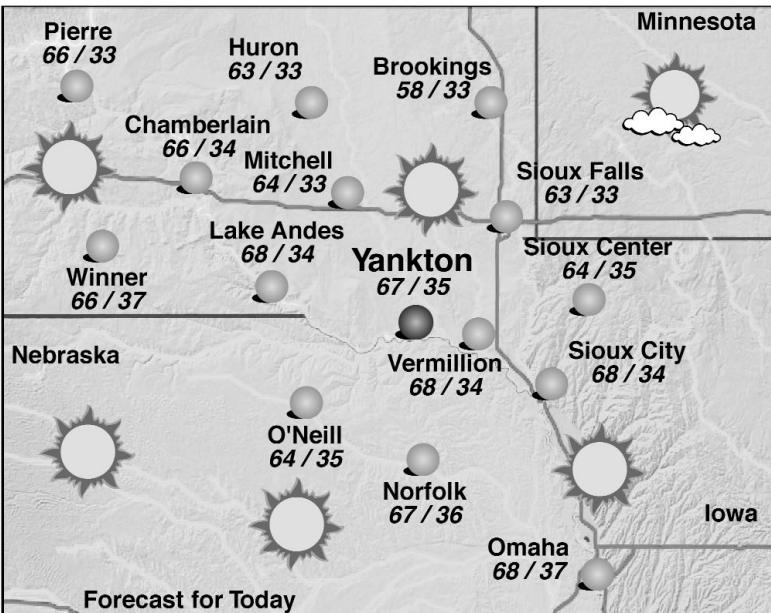

Concealed-Carry Permits Might Have Broader Reach For Those Who Get Training

PIERRE — South Dakotans soon might be able to legally carry concealed pistols in more states because of work by Rep. Tom Brunner and one of his friends, Dayle Hammock.

The Legislature approved a measure brought by Brunner, R-Nisland, creating an enhanced concealed-carry permit.

He said the additional requirements should make it acceptable for a South Dakotan to concealed-carry a pistol in Nebraska, Minnesota, Colorado and possibly other states.

South Dakota's standard concealed-carry permit applies within South Dakota's borders but frequently doesn't meet standards in other states.

People seeking the enhanced permit would need to participate in an approved handgun course, provide fingerprints to the county sheriff for a background check and pay \$100.

The permit would be valid for five years and have a \$50 renewal fee.

Brunner said the idea came out of talks with Hammock, a former law enforcement officer and a past member of the Meade County Commission.

"We chose to be positive and build on what

we've got. I think it's going to explode (in use) once people understand what we've got," Brunner said.

Now in his ninth year as a state representative, Brunner was waiting for word Thursday whether Gov. Dennis Daugaard will sign it into law.

What made HB 1215's journey different so far has been that, unlike many pieces of legislation dealing with guns, it hasn't attracted a nay vote during its travel through two committee hearings, the House of Representatives and the Senate.

South Dakota's organizations for county sheriffs and police chiefs supported the bill, as did the state Highway Patrol, state Attorney General Marty Jackley and the state Division of Criminal Investigation.

Dick Tieszen, a Pierre lawyer who lobbies on behalf of the sheriffs and once served as South Dakota's chief deputy attorney general, assisted Brunner on technical points.

Every change was checked beforehand with the attorney general or his staff, according to Brunner.

The bill stands as the only expansion of firearms rights approved during the 2015 legislative session.

"It was a lot of work getting everybody on board," Brunner said.

But House Majority Leader Brian Gosch said his caucus' current limit sits at 6 cents. He pointed to an amendment that the House passed to further raise vehicle license plate fees, which means millions of dollars in increased revenue.

Gosch said the bigger the hike, the more votes are lost. Tax increases require two-thirds legislative support to pass.

Republican Rep. Don Hagar, who is on the negotiating committee, said he appreciated the Senate's attempts to compromise. But he said that he wants to pass some form of the legislation.

Vehle said he's hopeful that lawmakers might reach a different outcome when they return to negotiations on Friday.

"I don't want to leave here with nothing," Vehle said. "We'll just sleep on it and see what we can come up (with) tomorrow. One day left."

WALL STREET RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks had their best day in five weeks on Thursday as the dollar fell against the euro. Gains for the U.S. currency are threatening profits of companies that rely heavily on overseas sales. Financial stocks climbed more than the rest of the market after a number of banks announced dividend increases and stock buybacks.

The Dow Jones industrial average gained 259.83 points, or 1.5 percent, to 17,895.22. The Standard & Poor's 500 index advanced 25.71 points, or 1.3 percent, to 2,065.95.
