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Quickly, **Highway Bill Signed Into Law**

PIERRE — No joke: Gov. Dennis Daugaard signed the highway and bridge funding legislation into state law Tuesday. Motorists will be able to drive 80 miles per hour, legally, on South Dakota's two interstate highways starting April 1. State Transportation

Secretary Darin Bergquist said work crews will be busy removing the current 75 mph signs and putting up new 80 mph signs along I-29 and I-90 in the

two weeks ahead.
"We estimate we will need approximately 250 new signs at \$100 each," Bergquist said Tuesday. "Obviously not all 250 new signs will be installed

at the same time on the same day, but the key, most important ones will be," he said.

"We will continue to add additional 80 mph signs where appropriate in the following days, somewhat dependent on how fast the signs can be produced.

The 80 mph won't apply in those urban areas where slower speeds were already set by the state Transportation Commission, such as around Rapid City and Sioux Falls.

Also, another new law that allows an extra 10 mph for passing applies only on two-lane highways and doesn't apply on the four-lane interstates.

The state taxes on motor fuels for highway travel will increase by six cents per gallon on April 1 as well.

Gasoline and diesel will be charged state tax of 28 cents per gallon, while ethanol blends will be taxes according to the ratio of gasoline and alcohol.

The state excise tax on vehicle purchases will change to 4 percent from the current 3 percent on April 1, too.

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ASH Hospital Begins Room Renovations

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A \$3.5 million, year-long renovation project is starting this week at Yankton's Avera Sacred Heart Hospital (ASHH). The project, which will update patient care rooms on its fifth floor/surgical floor, is being done to improve the hospital's patient care facilities.

'We think that this project will make the accommodations much more comfortable for patients, their family and also our staff," said Doug Ekeren, president and CEO of Avera Sacred Heart Hospital. "We will be renovating bathrooms and converting a lot of what used to be semi-private rooms into one-bed rooms in order to meet the expectations of our customers.

Currently, ASHH is licensed to house 144 hospital beds. However, Ekeren said the facility is set up currently for 105 beds and after the renovation is completed will offer numbers in the mid-80s.

"With the continued shift from in-patient to

outpatient care, we don't see the in-patient utilization rate that we have in the past, so it takes a little pressure off the number of beds we need," he said. "We have been planning this for several years. We must improve our rooms to meet the expectations of our patients. They are requesting private rooms with enhanced amenities, and we can do this is a manner that will also improve patient and staff

As part of the renovation project, patient rooms will be re-designed with larger handicap-accessible bathrooms, making them safer for patients and staff. They will also have reconfigured headwalls, new furnishings, new windows and an updated call light system.

The Surgical Unit will also have new floor and wall coverings in the hallways and nurse's station areas.

Ekeren said the improvements that will be seen in the rooms will be similar to those seen in the rooms renovated recently in the
