## There's No Reason **To Delay AG Vote**

LOS ANGELES TIMES (March 17): The Senate was expected to vote this week on the nomination of Loretta Lynch to be U.S. attorney general, more than four months after President Barack Obama announced that the veteran prosecutor was his choice to succeed Eric Holder. But Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, said over the weekend that he will delay that vote until the Senate resolves partisan differences over a bill designed to assist victims of human trafficking. Democrats have objected to anti-abortion language in the legislation.

It's specious for McConnell to suggest that a vote on Lynch must await approval of the trafficking legislation. There is no reason the Senate can't vote on the nomination and continue consideration of the bill.

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As Sen. Patrick J. Leahy of Vermont, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Judiciary Committee, noted, members voted last week on four other nominations while the trafficking bill was before the Senate, and votes on two more nominations were scheduled for Monday evening. The more plausible interpretation of McConnell's remarks is that a vote on Lynch is being used as leverage to win Democratic support for the trafficking bill.

Obama chose Lynch, the U.S. attorney in Brooklyn, on Nov. 8, but her nomination wasn't acted on by the Republican-controlled Judiciary Committee until Feb. 26, when she was approved on a 12-8 vote. Now McConnell is threatening further delays. By contrast, Secretary of Defense Ashton

Carter, who was nominated a month after Lynch was, received Senate confirmation Feb. 12.

Carter was an experienced and well-qualified candidate, but so is Lynch, who has been confirmed twice by the Senate for previous appointments. She received high praise from Republican senators after her nomination was announced. But some Republicans want to punish her for refusing to repudiate Obama's executive action deferring deportation for millions of immigrants in the country illegally. That helps to explain why only three Republicans on the Judiciary Committee supported her nomination, and why the outcome of a final vote is likely to be uncomfortably — and unjustifiably — close. (Some Democrats worry that additional delay, combined with Republican grandstanding on immigration, might make it impossible for Lynch to achieve the required majority when a vote is finally held.)

Ironically, the delay has left Holder, who has long been a bete noire for many Republicans, in charge at Justice — and has had no effect on Obama's immigration actions. Those actions are currently being challenged in court; Republicans should be content to let that process go forward and evaluate Lynch strictly on her stellar qualifications. In any case, she is entitled to a prompt up-or-down vote. McConnell should end his obstructionism.



# **New Smarter Balanced Testing Looms For YSD**

Like all South Dakota school districts, preparations for the Smarter Balanced Test have been on-going for several months. The Yankton School District will begin testing students in grades 3 through 8 and 11 during the second week of April.

The new Smarter Balanced Test, will evaluate Math and English Language Arts, and is aligned to the Common Core Standards. The Common Core Standards were adopted by the Yankton School District during the 2012-13 school year and are required by state law.

Parents may recall the Smarter Balanced Testing done last school year was a "trial run" required by the South Dakota Department of Education. Parents did not receive test results, and the state did not publish district results. However, this school year parents will receive their child's test results.

The new Smarter Balanced Test will continue to use online technology and there is the potential for several thousand students testing at one time across the state. As with any on-line testing, we are concerned about unforeseen technology glitches. The Yankton School Districts has budgeted and spent a significant amount of money in technology and staff time preparing for the required testing.

As with any testing, we want our students to take testing seriously and to do their best. We realize students and parents are always concerned about testing results. As a school district, we share these same concerns and are eager to see how well the Smarter Balanced Testing aligns with the Common Core Standards. Both of these initiatives were part of federal mandates and state mandates ap-

proved by the South Dakota Legislature. I want to thank our teachers and administrators for their preparation leading up to the Smarter Balanced Testing. Their positive outlook in the face of uncertainty and on-going changes being required by the Federal Department of Education and the South Dakota Department of Education is truly appreciated, as we begin testing.

## The Fairest Tax

South Dakota main revenue income comes from property taxes, sales tax and fees. There's no state income tax program.

Economists say that the property tax is the most unfair because it taxes without regard to the benefit derived from taxed property. A farmer or rancher must pay full taxes even though a crop failure happens. The same for a business owner, same taxes even on bad

The income tax is the most fair because it taxes according to the ability to pay at time

the taxed money is earned. A progressive income tax is most fair. The sales tax discriminated against lower income taxpayers because it extracts a greater percentage of their total income for bare necessity of life. Employer industries do not select South Dakota because of these high property taxes.

It's long past due that our state legislators address tax fairness and set up a state income tax program to reduce property taxes. Most states income tax programs exempt up to \$24,000 of income from retirement such as Social Security and other retirement programs from pay in tax on this income.
