USD Faces Tough Test In WNIT Opener

Creighton, a familiar opponent for the Coyotes, comes to Vermillion tonight (Thursday) at 7 p.m. for a firstround game in the WNIT at the Dako-

After falling short of their goal of reaching the NCAA Tournament again, the Coyotes (25-7) had to recharge for the WNIT, but learned Monday night that they would be putting their 14-0 home record on the line in the first

"It definitely puts a little bit of confidence in our team," said senior Nicole Seekamp, a 2-time Summit League tournament MVP.

'Our fans were at the games in Sioux Falls, but having that home atmosphere and everything, that should help us."

It has in recent years, at least. Dating back to the start of last the DakotaDome, but is 2-2 in Division I

post-season home games since 2011. Creighton (17-13), meanwhile, is a seasoned mid-major program that is in the WNIT for a second consecutive year — the Bluejays won an NCAA Tournament game in 2013.

Not only has Creighton found success in recent years, it has found success this season in ending long home winning streaks. Wins this season at South Dakota State and Seton Hall ended those program's 20-plus game

Once the Coyotes knew they would be in the WNIT field, they had a good sense that their first-round opponent would be a regional program (three years ago it was Drake). Once Creighton was announced, the players knew it would be a nice opportunity.

"We're excited, especially just to have a home game," junior Heidi Hoff said. "I think it can do a lot for our program if we can get a win against them."

Being paired with a mid-major

program like Creighton might not have been the best-case scenario, USD coach Amy Williams joked, but having the game at home is no doubt what the Coyotes wanted.

"There's so much that goes into

of that situation, it's outstanding that it

worked out like that." Prior to this season, Creighton and USD had played each of the previous four regular seasons, including a 63-48 victory by the Bluejays last season in

Omaha. "They have some tough players for us, matchup-wise," Williams said. "The last time we played Creighton, Marissa Janning went crazy on us and we only scored 48 points.

"Certainly, that was a rough night." Janning, a junior guard who was the Big East Conference pre-season Player of the Year, had 20 points and seven rebounds in that last meeting with USD. She averages 15.7 points this season.

The Bluejays also boast senior Alexis Akin-Otiko (12.7 ppg, 6.3 rpg) and fresh-man Sydney Lamberty (10.1 ppg, 4.2 rpg) as threats the Coyotes will have to contend with.

"We have an opportunity in front of us," Williams said. "A new chance to write a different ending for ourselves. "And we'd sure like it to go better."

The last time the South Dakota State women's basketball team won a game at the NCAA Tournament, Chloe Cornemann was there

Now, the junior from Yankton wants to be out on the court for another signature victory.

'SDSU's done it before, so we know we can," Cornemann said Wednesday, on the team bus on the way to airport in Sioux Falls.

The Jackrabbits (24-8), the Summit League champions, earned the No. 14 seed in the NCAA Tournament and will face third-seeded Oregon State (26-4) on Friday in Corvallis.

The game on OSU's campus will tip off at 4:15 p.m. Central and will be televised on ESPN2.

It's on that stage where Cornemann and the Jacks making their sixth NCAA Tournament appearance in seven years — are hoping to end a 4-game losing streak.

'(Coach Aaron Johnston) says we've been there before, we've done this," Cornemann said. "It's nothing new. We're just trying to get that next

Peitz Named Second-Team All-American

KANSAS CITY, Mo. -Hartington, Nebraska, native Tracy Peitz was named to the NAIA Division II All-America second team, announced on Wednesday.

Peitz, a senior at Concordia University, averaged 11.9 points and 4.8 rebounds for the Bulldogs, helping them advance to the national championship game. The former Cedar Catholic standout finished her career with 1,277 points, 594 rebounds, 281 assists and 306 steals.

Peitz's teammate, Bailey Morris, was named the national Player of the Year for Division II. Morris was a two-time Great Plains Athletic Conference Player of the

Other GPAC players earning first-team honors were Ashlyn Muhl of national and GPAČ regular season champion Morningside, and Jamie Van Kirk of Hastings. Junior Deaundra Young of College of St. Mary, which joins the GPAC in the 2015-16 season, was also named to the first

Pheasants Keep Things In Balance

PARKER — The Parker Pheasants believe they have the winning formula to make a run at the South Dakota State Class B Boys' Basketball Tournament.

That formula: balance.

"Most teams can shut down one player," said Parker (17-6) head coach Dave Fuller. "One game a team played a box-and-one on our best shooter, held him to three points, but we won the game. It's been somebody different stepping up every game. When we get everybody clicking, we're much tougher to beat.

Guards Zach O'Keefe (19 ppg, 4.5 rpg, 3.6 apg, 3.6 spg) and Landon Leberman (13 ppg, 4 rpg, 2.8 apg, 2.8 spg) have led the offense for Parker, but forward Zach Anderson (9.2 ppg, 7 rpg) and center Kelby Peters (9.1 ppg, 5 rpg, 2 apg, 2 spg) are just under double figures. Forward Ryan John (5.4 ppg, 3 rpg) and top reserve Cody Knock (5.3 ppg, 4.2 rpg) are

also key contributors. That balance has helped the Pheasants, making its first state tournament appearance since 1998,

compete this season. Of their six losses, two were to Class A opponents and two were to Chester, both by three points. Parker's most lop-sided setback came in the season opener, a 19-point affair with Class A McCook Central-Montrose and a loss the Pheasants avenged in the conference tournament.

'In our first game out we didn't know what we'd be like, and we were beaten soundly by McCook Central-Montrose," Fuller said. "The second time we played them, we beat them." The Pheasants will be

challenged in the opening round, drawing perennial power White River (21-2). The Tigers are in the tournament for a tenth straight season, but had their string of championship game appearances snapped at six last

"They are well coached, and they've been there 10 years in a row," Fuller said. "They have a little bit of a size advantage, but we've faced that all year."

While the Pheasants usually like to pick up the pace, that may not be the best idea against a team as athletic as White River, Fuller said. 'We need to slow the

tempo a lot," he said. "We can't give up easy baskets, and we need to control their shooters.

Fuller feels his team is up for the challenge.

'These kids are not content just to be there," he said. "They're hoping they can slay Goliath there, and I think we have the kids to do it."

The Parker-White River matchup is the 6 p.m. contest today (Thursday) at the Barnett Center in Aberdeen, followed by local favorite Langford Area (22-1) against Gregory (18-5), which makes its first state tournament appearance since 1963, at 7:45 p.m. Play begins at noon with top-seeded Faith (22-1) against Hitchcock-Tulare (16-7), followed by undefeated Wolsey-Wessington (23-0) against Hanson (19-4) at 1:45 p.m.

The tournament runs through Saturday in Aberdeen, with the championship set for 8 p.m. All first-round games, as well as Friday and Saturday evening sessions, will be broadcast on SDPB-3.
