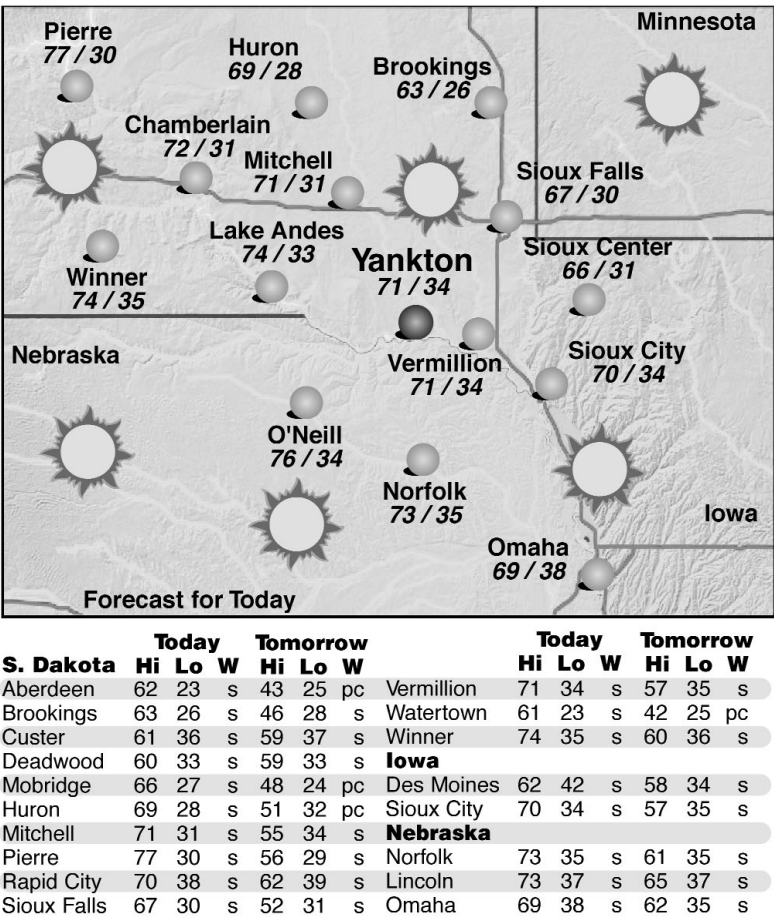

Emergency Solutions Program Grant Funds Available

PIERRE — South Dakota Housing Development Authority (SDHDA) is now accepting applications for the Emergency Solutions Grants Program. The Emergency Solutions Grants Program (ESG) is a federal block grant authorized by Subtitle B of the McKinney Vento Homelessness Assistance Act and is administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. ESG funds are to be used for services to homeless and near homeless individuals and families in these major categories:

- 1) Renovation, major rehabilitation or conversion of building for use as emergency shelter facilities;
- 2) Payment of certain operating expenses related to operating emergency shelter facilities;
- 3) Payment of essential services provided to homeless individuals and

families in emergency shelter facilities;

- 4) Payment of street outreach services to assist unsheltered homeless people and connect them to services;
- 5) Payment of rapid re-housing assistance to quickly get homeless individuals and families re-housed into permanent housing;
- 6) Development and implementation of homelessness prevention activities to help those individuals who are about to lose their housing due to eviction; and
- 7) Participating in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) which is a web-based program designed to capture client level data.

Applicants must be nonprofits or units of local government. The estimated total funding available for 2015 funding year is approximately \$400,000 with 60 percent of the

total funding available for street outreach and shelter operations activities and 40 percent available for homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, HMIS and administrative activities. While it is difficult to get an absolute account of the homeless, a 2014 survey reported there were more than 885 homeless people in South Dakota with 247 of them children. Single parent families made up 20 percent of the homeless who were surveyed. The ESG Program is one of several sources designated to reduce homelessness throughout the state. Hazard Mitigation Funding Available

PIERRE — The South Dakota Office of Emergency Management is accepting applications for \$1.4 million in federal hazard mitigation grant funding. The funding is available as part of a presidential disaster declaration approved for 12 South Dakota counties and one tribal nation last summer. Gov. Dugaard requested the declaration following a week of severe storms, flash flooding and tornadoes that ravaged homes and infrastructure across South Dakota in June 2014. When a presidential disaster is declared, a percentage of the disaster funding is set aside for local governments and certain private non-profit organizations to complete projects that will lessen or eliminate the effects of future disasters on lives and property. "We've had real success with mitigation projects here in South Dakota, particularly with power line burials," Mitigation and Recovery Manager Jason Bauder said. "In the past decade over 1,000 miles of overhead power line have been buried in South Dakota, eliminating the chance of those lines being torn down by future high winds or ice." Other hazard mitigation project examples include purchasing and removing structures from the designated floodplain and building community tornado safe rooms. Applications for mitigation funding will be accepted until April 1, 2015. PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Labor and Regulation has rolled out a mobile-friendly version of SDWORKS, the state's largest jobs database. The new site provides faster download speeds, portability and connectivity to job seekers. "Creating a website optimized for tablets and smartphones caters to a large portion of our job seekers and offers a more convenient way of searching for work," said state Labor and Regulation Secretary Marcia Hultman. The updated site also features expanded search capabilities which include:

- Geographical range searching — Users can select a zip code and define a

mileage radius they wish to search.

- Military Occupational Classifications — Allows veterans to search for jobs using their Military Occupational Classification Code.

In 2014, more than 20 percent of users to www.sd-jobs.org visited via tablet or mobile device. "With many people relying solely on their mobile devices to access the Internet, this site allows us to keep up with the needs of the people and businesses we serve," said Secretary Hultman. BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for May delivery was up 17.25 cents to \$5.12 a bushel; May corn fell 1.25 cents to 3.7350 a bushel; May oats were .25 cent lower at \$2.73 a bushel; while May soybeans declined 3.25 cents to \$9.6175 a bushel. Beef was higher and pork was

lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up 1.75 cents to \$1.5022 a pound; May feeder cattle rose 2.25 cents to \$2.1567 a pound; while June lean hogs fell .60 cent to \$.7452 a pound.

WALL STREET RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks closed mostly lower Thursday, led by declines in the energy sector as the price of oil resumed a long-term slide. Exxon Mobil and Chevron were among the biggest decliners in the Dow Jones industrial average. The Dow lost 117.16 points, or 0.6 percent, to 17,959.03. The Standard & Poor's 500 fell 10.23 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,089.27. The Nasdaq composite rose 9.55 points, or 0.2 percent, to 4,992.38.
