and Cassidy Gebhart. The Lancers will also learn in a couple months whether they will repeat as the national leader in team GPA. Mount Marty boasted the top mark in the NAIA ranks with a 3.746 cumulative GPA for the

2013-14 season. Over the years, the challenges of juggling coursework and basketball hasn't necessarily gotten easier, but to compartmentalize.

'We become really good at time management," she said. "It can be overwhelming when you're a freshman, but I've gotten better at it. As you get older, more experience really helps."

Experience also led to receiving an award.
