July Fourth Camping Reservations Open Soon

PIERRE -- As spring comes to South Dakota, thoughts turn to summer planning. Be sure to include plans for summer camping trips, as reservations for the Fourth of July weekend open up soon in South Dakota State Parks.

"July can seem ages away, especially when snow in April isn't unheard of in South Dakota, but spots fill up quickly." said Doug Hofer, state parks director. "Fourth of July weekend is always a busy time in the parks, so campers will need to plan ahead and make reservations as soon as possible to get their favorite camping spots."

April 4 is the first day to make reser-

vations for a July 3 arrival, which is the Friday of the Fourth of July weekend. Reservations open 90 days in advance of the arrival date, so those arriving earlier can make reservations earlier. As a holiday weekend, a minimum threenight stay is required.

To reserve your spot, go online at campsd.com or call 800.710.2267.

Reservations open at 7 a.m. CT on the first day of the 90-day period, both online and through the call center, which are open 24 hours a day after opening. A non-refundable reservation fee of \$7.70 is applied to each site; however, this fee is waived for state residents. Taxes also apply.

Campers can make reservations for arrivals up to one year out at Custer State Park and for all of the parks' group

Pine Ridge Mule Deer

Counted CHADRON, Neb. -- The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has completed the second year of an annual mule deer survey in portions of the Pine Ridge management unit in northwestern Nebraska.

On Feb. 6-9, Commission employees used a contracted helicopter to repeat the 2014 mule deer survey. Commission staff counted 758 deer in 429 square miles of the unit compared to 862 in the same areas in 2014. The data will be compared to mule deer numbers in other areas of the state to assess long-term trends.

Lower counts in 2015 may be attributable to less snow cover during the survey period, which makes spotting animals more challenging, said Todd Nordeen, a big game manager for the Commission. The data will be more telling when the survey completes its

scheduled five-year cycle, he said. The mule deer population has been a concern in the Pine Ridge and other areas of the American West experiencing declines despite quality habitat and harvest restrictions.

The survey is helping determine how the mule deer population responds to the prohibition of harvest of females, and is helping the Commission's goal of providing optimum hunting opportunities within the limits of the deer population and landowner tolerance. Since 2013, the Game and Parks Commission has prohibited mule deer doe harvest in the Pine Ridge unit to bolster the population.

I was keeping an eye on the weather, as we needed cold weather in order to get back into the dam we hoped to ice fish, but didn't need any sub zero temperatures or heavy

I was looking at ice fishing a pond southwest of town, one that was in the middle of a half section. We had tried once before to get back into it, which wasn't a good idea as it was just too muddy and we didn't want to tear up the field.

When the Press and Dakotan in-

dicted next week's weather would have sixty-degree weather, the next few days of cold weather looked to be our last opportunity

It was nine below zero when Team Outdoors-

Myhre (Sioux City, Iowa) pulled into the office, bitter cold with the wind that was howling in from the northwest.

We didn't need to worry about mud on this trip as everything, including much of the water in my minnow bucket was hard as a rock.

Bouncing over the corn rows, we made our way to the pond with some open water around the riser, so it was my job to hit the ice first with my Jiffy auger to see if we had enough good ice. I punched several holes, finding ten inches of ice, signaled my partner to join me.

I would punch the holes with Larry following behind with his Vexilar locator letting me know the depth.

We were looking for deeper water, as this time of the year in this type of pond, the fish searched out the deepest water in the dam.

The first two holes showed nothing but on each hole after that, fish appeared along the bottom. I knew there were Bass, Bluegill and Perch in the pond as a friend had fished it earlier, so I put down a livebait minnow rig for Bass and another for panfish, a small spoon and wax

Both of our locators showed fish that would move up and down with our lures, and it looked like it was going to be another of those late season trips where we had allot of lookers but not takers.

After several fish neglected to take the bait, Larry switched to a smaller lure, moved from hole to hole and then caught a small Bass before moving to another hole to

catch a Bluegill. It was time to make

This time of the year, fish are in their super slow mode, not moving much and not needing much to eat, so nothing much larger than a micro jig seems to attract many bites.

We moved from hole to hole, where the fish came up, looked at our baits and then moved off, so we moved to find fish that are more aggressive.

Grabbing the auger, I punched several new holes in an attempt to find deeper water and some biters. I moved towards the open water, five feet from the open water near the riser I located eleven foot of water that showed fish just off the bottom up to five feet.

As I kept an eye on my locator, I following my jig as it made its way down, the red marks, indicting fish started moving up towards my bait, I stopped it, raised it slightly, feeling additional weight, I set the hook and soon had a nice Bluegill flopping on

Each time my bait made it towards the bottom, the fish came up for it, stopping the bait, I twitched it, brought it up and "Bang", another fish was on the ice. After a few pictures, I dropped the fish back in the hole and got back into action.

As my bait descended, a thick red mark appeared on the locator, coming up to meet my bait, stopping the bait, I raised it with the fish in hot pursuit, I set the hook and landed the only Perch of the trip, a nice nine

Even though it was nine below zero, we toughed it out as we knew this would be the last ice fishing trip of the season, spending several hours on the pond, catching good numbers of Bluegill, Bass and the one Perch.

Larry and I caught several good Bluegills, a Perch as well as several smaller Bass, but that didn't bother us, as we weren't taking any fish home, releasing all that we caught.

After this trip, we'd have a long wait before we had an opportunity to hit the ice and this trip was one you would want to have to close the season, with allot of hungry fish anxious to take our offerings, allowing us to spend some time on the last ice.

chosen from Washington High School. The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the court, distinguishes Geu as South Dakota's best high school boys basketball player. Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Boys Basketball

Player of the Year award to be announced in March, Geu joins an elite alumni association of past state boys basketball award winners, including Dwight Howard (2003-04, SW Atlanta Christian Academy, Ga.), Chauncey Billups (1993-94 & 1994-95, George Washington HS, Colo.), Jason Kidd (1991-92, St. Joseph Notre Dame HS, Calif.), Paul Pierce (1994-95, Inglewood HS, Calif.) and Chris Bosh (2001-02, Lincoln HS, Texas).

The 6-foot-9, 180-pound senior forward has led the Warriors to a 21-2 record and a berth in the semifinals of the Class AA state quarterfinals against Huron, scheduled for March 19. Geu is averaging 17.5 points, 7.8 rebounds and 1.2 blocks per game entering the state tournament. He was selected to the All-City Team and the All-State Tournament Team as a junior.

Geu has maintained a B average in the classroom. He has volunteered locally on behalf of an elementary school literacy-outreach initiative.

Geu has signed a National Letter of Intent to play basketball on scholarship at North Dakota State University this fall.
