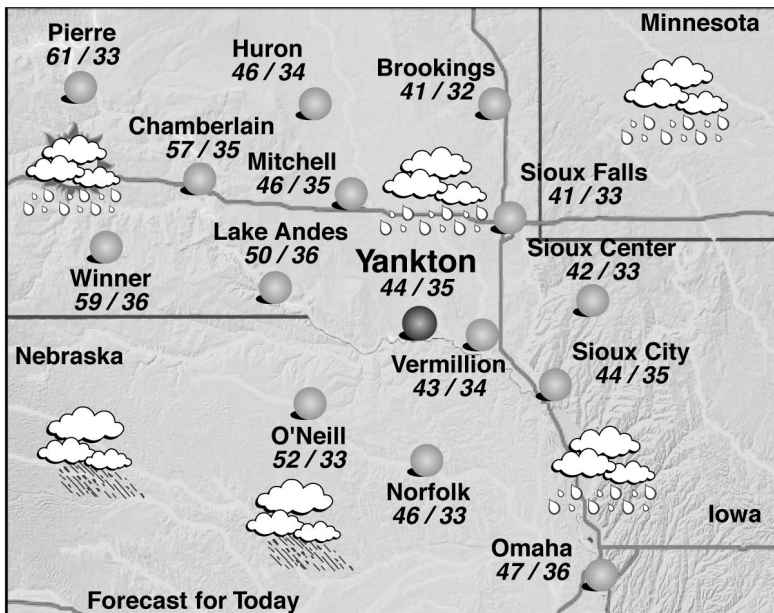

WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stock indexes closed with slight losses Monday following a strong performance last week. Six of 10 sectors in the Standard & Poor's 500 index fell. Industrial stocks slid the most. The Dow Jones industrial average lost 11.61 points, or 0.1 percent, to 18,116.04. The S&P 500 fell 3.68 points, or 0.2 percent, to close at 2,104.42.

The Nasdaq composite slipped 15.44 points, or 0.3 percent, to 5,010.97.

Wheat for May delivery was up 4 cents to \$5.34 a bushel; May corn rose 5.25 cents to 3.8925 a bushel; May oats were 2.50 cents higher at \$2.8150a bushel; while May soybeans advanced 9.75 cents to \$9.8350 a bushel. Beef was higher and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up 2.53 cents to \$1.53 a pound; May feeder cattle rose 3.27 cents to \$2.1867 a pound; while June lean hogs were .23 cent lower to \$.7362 a pound.

Yankton Event Looking 'Onward'

Young And Old Will Launch An Unusual Mystery Initiative April 1

Not much is expected of cities the size of Yankton these days. That needs to change, according to a new group of young and old leaders.

So it's no April Fool's joke that the Yanktonians intend to launch a new initiative on April 1 in the theater of the town's high school with students, teachers, business and community activists and anyone interested.

And exactly what's the announcement?

Well, nobody's saying. The group called Onward Yankton has quietly formed, and members say they expect participation to expand.

"We hope this is the start of something big, but it's really up to all of the community," said Michelle Cwach, a farmwife and media relations manager at a local manufacturer. "We are starting at the high school because — I can say this much — we want to make Yankton

a better place for today's teens to live and work and raise their own families."

"We can't find any example of another community that has done something like what we're planning," said Tabitha Likness, another one of the early organizers of the mysterious project. Likness, who works at Mount Marty College, said an interesting mix of "old hands and newcomers" have come together to plan the launch.

The announcement will begin at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, April 1, at a special meeting of One Million Cups, the entre-

preneurial gathering that meets weekly in Yankton. It will be held in the Yankton Senior High School theater. Everyone is welcome.

The organizers will do a repeat performance at the Yankton Middle School at 1 p.m. on the same day. Other schools in the greater Yankton area are planning to live-stream the 9 a.m. event. School officials from neighboring towns are also welcome to do the same by accessing the school's website.

Cwach said a Facebook page titled Onward Yankton has already been formed, and a website (onwardyankton.com) will go live on the morning of April 1.

"We'd like to tell people to contact us for more information, but the truth is that we're not saying anything else until the morning of April 1," said Likness.
