












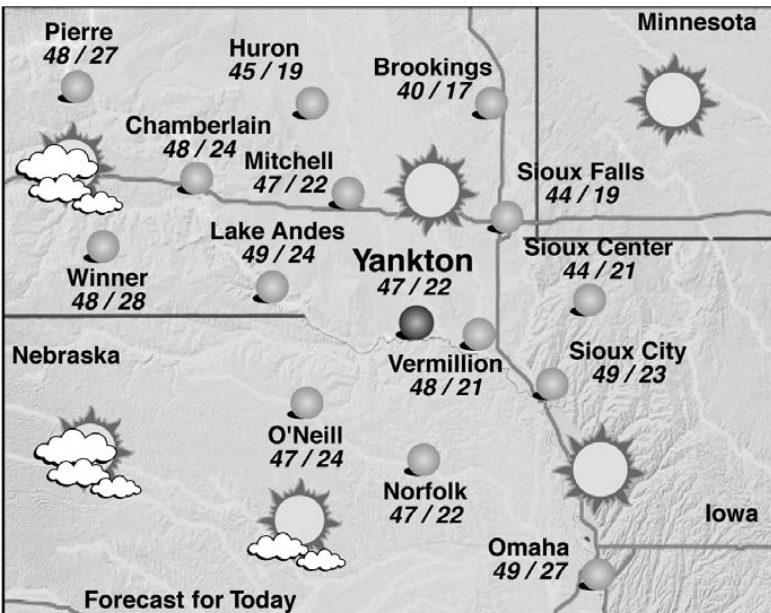

This ceremony affords attendees the opportunity to express our gratitude, remember their service and say thank you and welcome home.

Attendees are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets, sunscreen, sunglasses and water.

Immediately following the ceremony,

Pierre American Legion Post 8 will host a celebration reception (free-will donation) from 2:30-5 p.m.

Veterans will be provided numerous opportunities throughout the weekend to network and share their stories.

Saturday, March 28, events include VA briefings from Sioux Falls VA Health Care System Director Darwin Goodspeed and Dakotas Regional Office benefits team members at 10 a.m., an Agent Orange and Toxic Chemical Town Hall at 1 p.m., a celebration dinner for Vietnam Veterans and their families will be hosted by Pierre Post 8 at 6 p.m. (free will donations), and at 7 p.m. a

pre-screening of "Last Days in Vietnam," a PBS American Experience Production will be aired.

On Sunday, March 29, a Welcome Home Breakfast will be held at McClelland's Restaurant in Fort Pierre (902 Walleye Drive) with serving from 7 a.m.-10 a.m. At noon, participants will begin lining up for the "Celebration" procession, which starts at 1 p.m., and will travel from McClelland's to the Vietnam Memorial at Capitol Lake in Pierre. The VA mobile Vet Center will be located at Capitol Lake and staff will be on hand to provide outreach to veterans.

Wheat for May delivery was off 4.50 cents to \$5.19 a bushel; May corn rose 1.75 cents to 3.95 a bushel; May oats were .25 cent higher at \$2.8225 a bushel; while May soybeans lost 3 cents to \$9.7875 a bushel.
Beef and pork were lower on

the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was off .68 cent to \$1.5237 a pound; May feeder cattle fell 1.90 cents to \$2.1597 a pound; while June lean hogs were .07 cent lower to \$.7460 a pound.

WALL STREET RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. stocks closed lower Wednesday, bringing the market further below record highs reached earlier this month. Nine of the 10 industry sectors in the Standard & Poor's 500 index fell. Energy was the only sector to rise, helped by a gain in the price of crude oil.

The Dow Jones industrial average lost 292.60 points, or 1.6 percent, to 17,718.54.
The S&P 500 index fell 30.45 points, or 1.5 percent, to 2,061.05.
The Nasdaq composite fell 118.21 points, or 2.4 percent, to 4,876.52.

The Dow is down 409.11 points, or 2.3 percent.
The S&P 500 index is down 47.05 points, or 2.2 percent.
The Nasdaq is down 149.90 points, or 3 percent.
