time, treasures and talents with young and old." Volunteering has always been a big part of Goeden's life, and she said it has a lot to offer for those who take part. "You get out and you meet so many people," she said. "It's just wonderful. Everybody should try it." One of Goeden's earliest experiences as a volunteer was housing foreign exchange students. "Four of them stayed with us over the years," she said. It was these experiences that encouraged her to continue volunteering right up to this day — and she said the positive effects continue. "My daughter says it has made me much younger," she laughed. Winterringer said that according to a recent USA Weekend poll,

nearly three-quarters of United States citizens "would rather invest their time and energy in a cause than simply write a check." She added that South Dakota has an average annual volunteer rate of 36.4 percent of residents volunteering with 39.2 hours per resident — ranking seventh in the nation. "That makes 221,000 volunteers serving 23.7 million hours of service per year," Winterringer said. "That makes each of you an ingredient in our recipe for success." Winterringer concluded the ceremony with a quote from Leo Buscaglia: "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around." "It is with all those ingredients that we make a difference and become a success in our lives," she said. CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

Grains futures traded mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery rose 9 cents to \$5.1075 a bushel; July corn fell 2.5 cents to \$3.69 a bushel; July soybeans gained .5 cent to \$9.87 a bushel; and July oats dropped 4.75 cents to \$2.0825 a bushel. Meanwhile, livestock futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle rose 0.50 cent to 96.02 cents a pound; August feeder cattle slipped 0.05 cent to \$1.165 a pound; June lean hogs fell .17 cent to 86.75 cents a pound; and May pork bellies jumped 1.48 cents to \$1.012 a pound.

the same way the federal government would be treated," PUC Chairman Dusty Johnson said. Paul Blackburn, a lawyer for Plains Justice, which represents landowners, issued a statement welcoming the change. He said ranchers shouldn't have to pay to remove fossils in most cases

because they never asked to have the pipeline cross their land. TransCanada would be responsible for any damage done to fossils during construction. The permit approved in February required TransCanada Keystone to notify landowners of any hazardous materials spills on their land. The company said that could be a bother if landowners had to be told of even small oil drips from equipment. It proposed reporting only spills exceeding 5 gallons.
