Bruins are one win away from a surprising trip to the Eastern Conference finals that has been 18 years in the making.

Blake Wheeler and Miroslav Satan scored 94 seconds apart to stun the Philadelphia Flyers on their home ice and get Boston rolling in Game 3. Tuukka Rask took over from there and made all the huge saves.

Mark Recchi and Patrice Bergeron also scored for Boston in a 4-1 win over the Flyers that lifted the Bruins to a commanding 3-0 lead in the Eastern semifinal

series on Wednesday night. Boston is on the brink of a sweep and

"We outplayed them pretty much in the first two periods. Our confidence was fine, we just couldn't get the puck past Tuukka," Asham said. "He made some big saves for them and blocked a lot of shots. I think if we play the same way Friday night, we will be fine.

The Flyers' first home playoff game as injuries forced center David Krejci and

since April 20 had an unusual vibe from the start. There were large patches of empty seats — mostly in the upper deck — and the normally rocking crowd of 20,000-plus was quiet from the opening faceoff.

Perhaps they sensed something. The Flyers gave their fans a quick jolt, scoring first when Asham flipped the puck under a sliding Rask's glove only 2:32 in. It did more than give the Flyers the first lead of the game — it was their first lead of the series.

Vikings Stadium Bill Suffers Setbacks

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — A bill for a new Vikings stadium lost ground Wednesday after being defeated in a key House committee, undergoing major surgery in a Senate panel and losing the spotlight to a court ruling over last

year's budget. The bill's Senate sponsor refused to declare it dead, but Gov. Tim Pawlenty said stadium discussions are "not helpful" as he and lawmakers grapple with the implications of a Supreme Court ruling overturning budget cuts he made

"I would hope the Legislature would turn its attention to these budget issues, which are of constitutional magnitude," Pawlenty said. "They are the first order of business, they are the most important order of business and we need to have focus on that.

Sen. Tom Bakk, the bill's Senate sponsor, said the proposal could still find a way through the legislative process, but the new budget wrinkle doesn't help its chances. The state constitution requires the Legislature to adjourn by May 17.

In two hearings, stadium backers took pointed questions from lawmakers about the proposal for

a new \$791 million facility.

A House state and local government operations panel rejected the proposal on a 10-9 vote.

The defeated bill would have tapped a stream of Minneapolis tax money now going to pay off bonds on the city's convention center. It also would have established a new lottery scratch-off game and envisioned the team paying a third of

Hours later, a similar Senate government operations panel approved a different version of the bill on a 9-3 vote. The version that passed was significantly made over from the original bill, which would have raised taxes on jerseys, hotel rooms and car rentals.

The Senate bill now contains a plan to bring in an unspecified amount of money by selling permanent seats in the new stadium. Sen. Harris, said good seats could go

for as much as \$20,000.

Even so, Vikings executive Lester Bagley said a similar proposal for the Twins ballpark was scrapped because it didn't bring in enough money.

Minneapolis was an early focus, but City Council member Elizabeth Glidden outlined the city's reservations about giving up convention center money. She said the state's largest city shouldn't have to finance a stadium alone.

"The Vikings are a statewide asset, so we need a statewide solution," she said.

Bagley said the quest for a new stadium continues.






