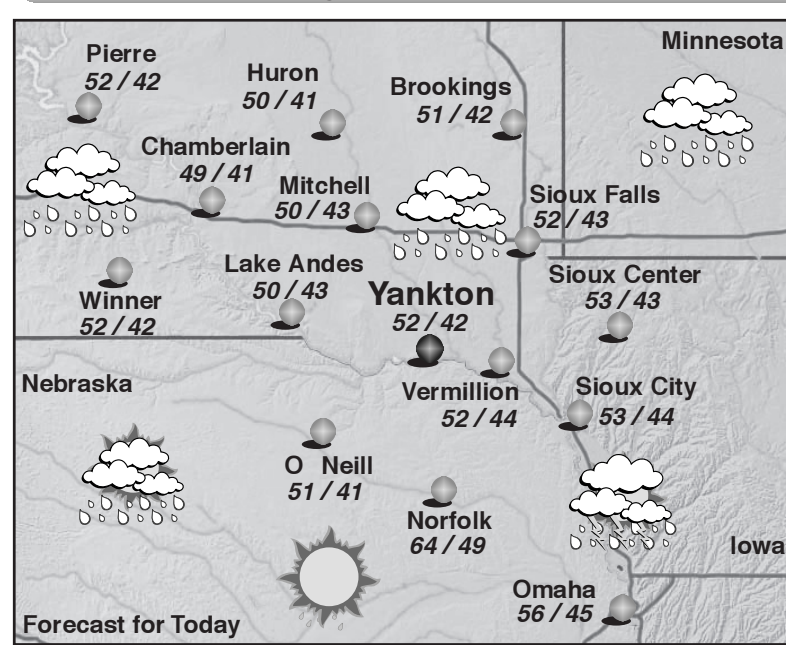

Last spring, while the Education Club seemed to have lost its focus, Juffer — then the vice president — approached faculty advisor Nick Shudak about tackling new activities. Since that meeting, the organization assisted with the annual MMC Halloween party, helped with the Beadle Elementary Carnival, hosted the local Girl Scouts Bonanza and participated in Read Across America Day at each of Yankton's elementary schools — an activity that earned the club the "Outstanding Class Project Award" from the South Dakota Education Association. "To me, Cody was made for an award like this," said Shudak, an

assistant professor of teacher education. "It shows his desire to do good work for the community. He's not the kind of person who wants to be a part of something that doesn't do good work." It's that attitude that causes the soft-spoken Juffer to deflect most, if not all, personal recognition on to his fellow Education Club members and their participation. "A lot of the smaller school districts, especially in Yankton, are so good about hiring student teachers, so I just wanted to make sure we were represented," Juffer said. "We weren't doing nearly enough, so we really tried to step it up." Coming from a smaller school district in Wagner, Juffer said he felt most comfortable with smaller communities while applying for a teaching position after graduation. And Thursday night, he

received a job offer from the Viborg School District, and by Friday, he had accepted. "I'm just so anxious to continue what I've been doing," he said. The decision for Lovell to leave her home state of Massachusetts was due in part to a desire to join a smaller community. Coming from Plymouth, a town of nearly 60,000 located 40 miles south of Boston, Lovell enrolled at Mount Marty to not only play soccer for the Lancers, but also to experience a different college experience. "I wanted to play soccer in college, and I really wanted to try something away from the East Coast," she said. "I liked the smaller atmosphere out here." Though she said she always considered joining the military, Lovell did not join ROTC until her sophomore year after attending

some events with her friends. And because Mount Marty provides students with the opportunity to participate in ROTC through a partnership with USD, Lovell got a double dose of small-town life. "I feel like I got the best of both worlds," said Lovell, who traveled to Vermillion for a one-day-a-week class during the last two years. "I got to meet new people in both communities. I just knew after a while, that this was for me." And it was while in Vermillion that Lovell developed the leadership qualities that led to her receiving the Marshall Award, said LTC Tom Martin, head of the Military Science Department at USD. "Early on, I saw somebody who had the ability, but was maybe just unsure of how to use those abilities," Martin said. "But she's really grown into a great example. You couldn't ask for anything more."

As the top cadet — out of 25 members — in USD's ROTC program, Lovell was selected to attend the George C. Marshall Conference last month in Lexington, Va. There, she and the 273 other cadets in each of the nation's battalions were recognized at a banquet. Now, following her MMC graduation, Lovell plans to return to Massachusetts to join the state's National Guard as Second Lieutenant Lovell. "I'm anxious to get back home with my family and friends," she said. "But overall, this was an amazing experience. The Midwest has really grown on me."

According to Rob Stephenson, the chairman of the Sacred Heart Finance Committee, there were early questions about whether or not to remodel the existing structure across the street from Sacred Heart Church. In the end, the decision was made to construct a new building. "We've been talking on campus for the last 10 years about the need to create more of a community center," Stephenson said. The biggest question was, "How do we do it?" Before the traditional dig by both pastors at Saturday's ceremony,

there was a meal and brief presentation inside Link Auditorium — a structure that will remain, but will see cosmetic improvements. Yankton mayor Dan Specht issued a proclamation stating May 8 would be known as Yankton Catholic Community Day. In addition, a history of the project was shared with both congregations gathered in the small auditorium. Now that the project has reached the construction phase, Saturday's groundbreaking ceremony was even more meaningful, according to Josten. "I loved seeing both parishes working together like this," said Josten, who came to Yankton last July. "What's good for one is good for the other, and that's the attitude I've seen throughout this entire project."

 - The Rural Electric Association marks 50 years in the U.S. on Saturday, with South Dakota's celebration set for Burbank, the original office of Clay-Union Electric — the first electric cooperative in the state.
 - Citing what "appears to be a grossly deficient record" in hiring and promoting women, the Federal Communications Commission on Thursday ordered the University of South Dakota to submit regular reports on employment at the school's radio and TV stations at Vermillion.
