VERMILLION — The ninth annual Lawrence Brothers Science Camp will be held from July 11-16 on the campus of the University of South Dakota in Vermillion.

cent and 17 percent turnout, respectively, on Tuesday.

In Lincoln, however, turnout is expected to be higher as voters are being asked to approve a \$344 million arena that would house the University of Nebraska basketball teams.

Lancaster County Election Commissioner David Shively said early voting numbers are up, with about 15,000 requesting early ballots or voting early in person.

"I'm sure the arena is drawing a good bit of interest in our area," Shively said.

Shively estimates 33 percent of the county's 176,795 registered voters will turn out to vote on Tuesday.

It's typical for voter turnout to be light during primary elections — particularly during midcycle election years, said Assistant Secretary of State Neil Erickson.

The state saw turnout of less than 22 percent in the 2002 pri-

mary election and just 21 percent in 2004.

In 2006, 35 percent of voters cast ballots in primary elections. That was the year Gov. Dave Heineman defeated Nebraska football legend and U.S. Rep. Tom Osborne in the Republican gubernatorial race.

That compares with primary elections that routinely saw more than 40 percent of voters turn out in the 1980s and early 1990s.

The race for state treasurer has seen little interest, even though the eventual winner could end up out of a job in four years if voters approve a measure to appear on the November ballot that would abolish the 155-year-old office.

Those vying for the post on the Republican ballot are state Sen. Tony Fulton of Lincoln, former Nebraska State Patrol head Tom Nesbitt and former Nebraska Attorney General Don Stenberg. Mark Stoj is a Democrat running unopposed in the primary.

Interest in local races and bond issues could affect turnout in some places. There are nine contested races for seats in the nonpartisan Legislature.

Every birthday was celebrated with a cake homemade by Mom.

Aside from her family, Louise loved the Colorado mountains, playing the piano, listening to music, visiting with her adult children, spending time with her grandchildren and early road trips in the bus Ed converted to a camper — even if it did break down every time! She loved telling children about Jesus, she spent 60-plus years teaching Sunday School and Vacation Bible School.
