a news conference, surrounded by environmentalists and leaders from an array of energy companies.

"This is a bill for energy independence after a devastating oil spill, a bill to hold polluters accountable, a bill for billions of dollars to create the next generation of jobs and a bill to end America's addiction to foreign oil," Kerry said.

Lieberman predicted the bill will pass, citing what he called a growing and unprecedented coalition of business, national security, religious and environmental leaders who are "energized" to work for it.

He and Kerry said in an interview that Senate colleagues have been surprised at the strong support from business leaders, including oil companies, major utilities and the nuclear power industry. Among those attending Wednesday's news conference were Jim Rogers, chairman and CEO of North Carolina-based Duke

Energy; Tom Kuhn, president of the Edison Electric Institute, which represents shareholder-owned electric companies; and Lew Hay, chairman and CEO of FPL Group Inc., a Florida-based power company.

The bill also is supported by most environmental groups. A coalition of 22 groups, including the Sierra Club, Natural Resources Defense Council, Environmental Defense Fund and the Wilderness Society, endorsed the bill in a joint letter Wednesday.

Obama added his support, saying the nation must work to end its dependence on fossil fuels.

"The challenges we face — underscored by the immense tragedy in the Gulf of Mexico — are reason to redouble our efforts to reform our nation's energy policies," Obama said. "For too long, Washington has kicked this challenge to the next generation."

Despite the lofty rhetoric, the measure faces a steep road in the Senate amid partisan disputes over the drilling provision and other issues, including immigration reform.

Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham, who had been the

bill's only Republican backer, withdrew his support last week, saying it is impossible to pass the legislation in the current political climate.

Graham issued a statement Wednesday praising the bill but casting doubt on its prospects.

"The problems created by the historic oil spill in the Gulf, along with the uncertainty of immigration politics, have made it extremely difficult for transformational legislation in the area of energy and climate to garner bipartisan support at this time," Graham said.

The bill, altered in recent days in response to the Gulf of Mexico spill, would allow states to opt out of federal drilling up to 75 miles from their shores, a concession to lawmakers concerned about offshore exploration in the aftermath of the Gulf Coast disaster.

It also would allow states directly affected to veto drilling plans of nearby states if they could show that significant negative effects would result from an accident. The bill requires an Interior Department study to determine whether states could be economically and environmentally affected by a leak from an offshore drilling rig.

"Many other states are facing their budget problems, which are much more significant than ours, and looking to taxes as a solution," Daugaard said. "I'm all for that — in those other states. I think it encourages people to see South Dakota as the best place to do business."

The state already has a track record of attracting companies from elsewhere due to its business-friendly environment, he stated.

"I think it takes consciousness effort to maintain it, not just in the tax area but on the regulatory side as well," Daugaard said. "It's the nature of government to add regulation and law. It's the rare legislator who doesn't point to a bill passed that's added to our statutes as an accomplishment of which he or she is proud. One of the things government has to do, and I intend to do, is be deliberate about constraining and cutting regulation if we can."

As the executive director of the Children's Home Society of South Dakota, he said he was involved in cutting the organization's policies and procedures in half. The damage that can be done with expanded legislation, or even the threat of expanded legislation, has been seen nationally, according to Daugaard.

Healthcare reform and proposed "cap-and-trade" legislation have stymied the economic recovery of the nation because companies are afraid to take risks when the playing field is being changed, he said. As governor, Daugaard said he will be very involved in economic development efforts.

"Gov. Rounds has been a good closer. I've been in the room when he's closed business deals," he said. "I hope to be a good closer. But I think the governor can also be a good door-opener. In my experience, that's been one of my jobs. When I was in banking for 10 years, I was in charge of new business. I made cold calls. I brought someone from the initial point of contact to a close."

Daugaard said he would be willing to make calls to out-of-state CEOs, CFOs or COOs who have a South Dakota connection — whether they grew up in the state or graduated from one of its institutions of higher learning. Because they are familiar with the state, they may be open to moving operations here, especially when comparing the business environment of this state to where they are currently.

"I think by careful targeting, the governor can be a good door-opener, as much as a business closer," he said.

Although the state must use its low-cost environment to encourage the development of new and current businesses and attract those from outside, wages should not be one of the low costs that are promoted, Daugaard said he wants to see wages in the

state go up, while businesses are drawn to things such as low power costs and no income tax.

Asked about what he is most proud of during his eight years as lieutenant governor, he said it is the fact he's been loyal and responsible in that position.

"I think someone who want me to differ with the governor in public forget what my job is," Daugaard said. "The job of lieutenant governor is to be governor if something would happen to the governor. It's not to differ on policy. Whatever my own thinking might be on this or that issue, I've always subjugated that, because to differ with the governor to any great degree results in a less trusting governor of his lieutenant. To the extent that he trusts me less, he'll communicate with me less. And then I'm going to be less prepared."

He admitted that he's been criticized for his loyalty to Gov. Rounds, and it

has been interpreted as a lack of ability to lead. However, Daugaard said his loyalty has proven to be an asset.

"(Gov. Rounds) trusts me completely, and he always shares every bit of information that I want," Daugaard said. "To that extent, I'm that much more prepared than I would be if we were in conflict."

Even on the campaign trail, he said he is not about to change his behavior.

"I want to promote my own agenda and ideas," Daugaard said. "To the extent that they're similar to the governor, they are. To the extent they're dissimilar, they are."

Daugaard said he knows he's his own man who has accomplished many things and led a life of his own before Rounds entered the picture.

"I've done things on my own, and I didn't have Mike Rounds telling me what to do," he said.

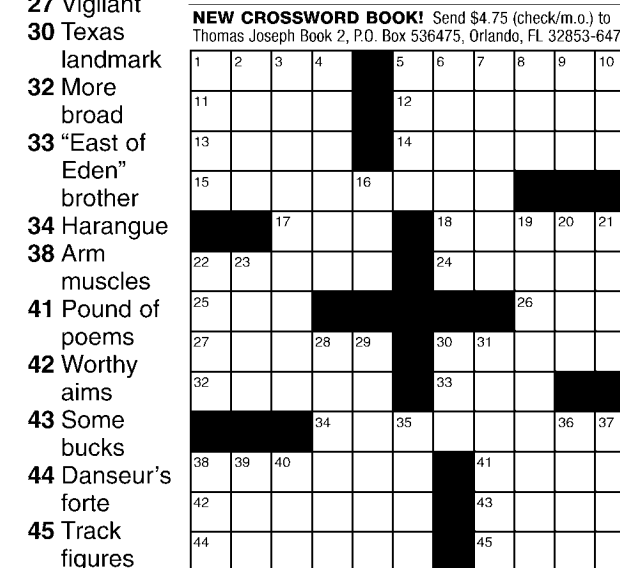
