On the girls' side, the Hartington Wildcats and the Wynot Blue Devils are each tied for 19th place after day one.

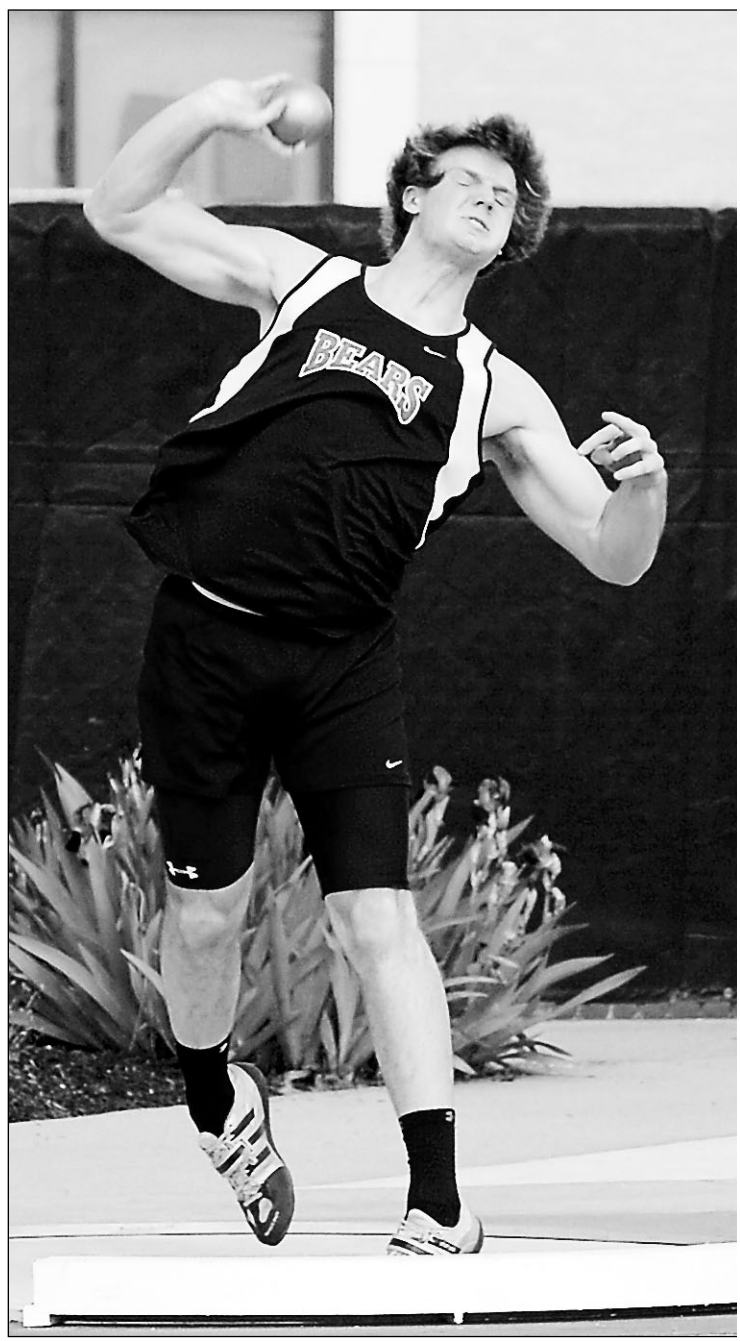

NCAA: Top-Ranked Washington Beats NDSU

SEATTLE — Wash.—Danielle Lawrie threw a four-hit shutout and hit a two-run home run to lead No. 1-ranked Washington to a 3-0 win over North Dakota State in the opening round of the NCAA Seattle Regional played Friday, May 21, before 1,610 in Husky Softball Stadium. North Carolina defeated Nebraska 1-0 in the first game.

North Dakota State (33-24) is scheduled to play Nebraska (29-28) in a loser's bracket game at 7:30 p.m. (Central) Saturday, May 22. Washington (46-6) plays North Carolina (41-18) at 5 p.m. (Central) in a winner's bracket game. The NDSU-NU winner plays the UW-UNC loser at 10 p.m. (Central) on Saturday.

Lawrie, who improved to 36-2, posted her 21st shutout of the season. She struck out 13 batters and worked out of trouble several times when the Bison threatened during the game. NDSU was shut out for the only the fourth time this season.
