Nebraska governor R. L. Cochran today signed the new liquor law, loosening the spigot which for 18 years has blocked the legal flow of liquor in Nebraska. Constitutional prohibition was repealed by the voters by a 110,000 majority last fall.  
President Roosevelt and House and Senate leaders agreed tentatively today on a 2 1/2 months extension of NRA and giving the recovery agency jurisdiction over businesses "substantially affecting" interstate commerce.

pavilions at the World Expo, Clinton waded into crowds, shook hands and posed for photos. The underlying message in her cultural charm offensive was that the U.S. and China share basic values and, as world powers, should work together to counter global problems.

Her trip is a hectic and intense three-nation journey to Asia. She stopped briefly in Japan on Friday, and her schedule put her in Beijing on Sunday and the South Korean capital of Seoul on Wednesday.

"Virtually every major challenge that we face in the world requires China and the United States to work together," she told staff at the U.S. Consulate

General in Shanghai she said before heading to Beijing.

The downed ship is crowding out all else on her agenda, even the high-level strategic and economic talks between the U.S. and China on Monday and Tuesday that were the main thrust of her trip.

The release Thursday of the report blaming North Korea changed all that. Now, her chief task is persuading China to go along with U.N. Security Council action against North Korea.

An international team of civilian and military investigators said that a North Korean submarine fired a homing torpedo on March 26, ripping South Korea's 1,200-ton Cheonan in two. Fifty-eight sailors were rescued, but 46 died — South Korea's worst military disaster since the 1950-53 Korean War.

The U.N. Command began an

investigation Saturday into whether the sinking violated the Korean War truce agreement. The North denounced the investigation as a "bogus mechanism," and has denied any role in the sinking, claiming that South Korea fabricated evidence to frame the North.

China is North Korea's primary ally and financial supporter. Beijing has been neutral on the conclusions of the report.

In Tokyo on Friday, Clinton said the evidence was "overwhelming" that North Korea was

behind the sinking and that the reclusive communist country must face international consequences.

Chinese officials have appealed for calm and called the sinking "unfortunate." But they have stopped short of backing South Korea, instead reiterating long-standing views on the need to maintain peace on the peninsula. China is a veto-holding permanent member of the Security Council, so its backing for any action is critical.
