JAMESTOWN, N.D. (AP) — Jamestown College has lost its men's and women's basketball coaches.
 The school announced Monday that men's coach Jeff Trumbauer had resigned to become assistant coach at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, and women's coach Mark West stepped down to become principal at St. John's Academy in Jamestown. Both men had been in their positions for the past six seasons. Trumbauer had a 94-84 record with the Jimmies. The team won the DAC conference tournament this past season and reached the first round of the NIAA tournament for the second time in three years.
 West was 105-69 with the women's team. He led them this year to a school record 26-7 season to finish 10th in the NIAA. The squad reached the Sweet Sixteen round of the NIAA tournament.

 Led by players who stormed back this postseason from injury and a colossal deficit, the Philadelphia Flyers have rekindled some of their old "Broad Street Bullies" championship days and can win their first Stanley Cup since 1975.
 Mike Richards scored an empty-netter in a most bruising fashion, Arron Asham and Jeff Carter scored goals 84 seconds apart in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference finals and the Flyers beat the Montreal Canadiens 4-2 on Monday night to advance to their first Cup finals since 1997.

BOSTON (AP) — Jameer Nelson made back-to-back 3-pointers in overtime. Dwight Howard had 32 points and 16 rebounds, and the Orlando Magic beat the Boston Celtics 96-92 on Monday night to avoid a four-game sweep in the Eastern Conference finals.
 Dressing in the same locker room where the Philadelphia Flyers celebrated their comeback from a 3-0 deficit against the Boston Bruins in the NHL's East semifinals, the Magic avoided elimination and sent the series back to Orlando for Game 5 on Wednesday night.
 The Bruins also lost Game 4 in overtime.
 No NBA team has ever come back from a 3-0 deficit in a best-of-seven series.
