Celtics Finish Off Orlando With 96-84 Victory

BOSTON (AP) — The NBA's most-decorated team avoided the biggest playoff collapse in league history and earned a chance to hang an unprecedented 18th championship banner from the rafters. Paul Pierce had 31 points and 13 rebounds, and little-used backup Nate Robinson gave the Celtics a boost with 13 second-quarter points as Boston beat the Orlando Magic 96-84 on Friday night, earning a chance to play for a second NBA title in three years. "Obviously, one is special," Celtics coach Doc Rivers said, acknowledging that it's not enough to rank among the great teams in franchise history. "The other groups have a couple, and we would love to join that club. No one can ever take away that first one, but we want to join the other club, too." The finals will begin Thursday in either Los Angeles or Phoenix.

The Lakers lead the Western Conference finals 3-2, and a victory over the Suns in Game 6 on Saturday would set up the cross-coast rivals for a rematch of the 2008 finals — and 10 other championship series from 1959-87. The Boston fans have been chanting "Beat L.A." since Game 3, when the Celtics cruised to a 3-0 lead in the best-of-seven Eastern Conference finals. Orlando won the next two games and threatened to become the first team ever in the NBA — but the second in Boston this month — to come back from a 3-0 deficit in a playoff series. The Bruins opened a 3-0 lead against Philadelphia in the NHL's Eastern Conference semifinals before the Flyers rallied to win — in the very same building. The Magic, who dressed in the same locker room where the Flyers celebrated their comeback, couldn't match it — or even force the

series back to Orlando for a Game 7. "This starting five has never lost a series, ever," Rivers said, alluding to the injury that kept Kevin Garnett out for the postseason last year and kept the new Big Three from defending its '08 title. "We believed that coming into the season, and we just kept believing." Dwight Howard had 28 points and 12 rebounds as the defending East champions failed to get back to the finals. Vince Carter scored 17 points, and Jameer Nelson finished with 11 points and four assists as he was outplayed by Boston's starting point guard, Rajon Rondo, and Robinson, his backup. Reporters and fans snickered when Rivers said last month that Robinson, who had struggled to get playing time and contributed little since coming to Boston at the trade deadline and had never appeared in the postseason before, "He's going to win us a playoff game."

Freeman Rallies To 12-11 Victory Over Irene

FREEMAN — The Freeman Black Sox responded to Irene's four-run ninth inning with a four-run bottom of the ninth, rallying to a 12-11 victory in South Central League amateur baseball action Friday. Freeman led a back-and-forth game 7-5 after three innings, holding that margin until Irene tied the game with two runs in the sixth. The contest was knotted until the Black Sox regained the lead with a single run in the bottom of the eighth, but the Cardinals scored four runs in the

top of the ninth to take an 11-8 advantage. Allan Scherschligt led off the ninth with a home run. Later in the frame, Brett Scherschligt tied the game with a two-run double, and scored the game-winner on Geoffrey Pfeiffer's single. Derek Walther had a home run and two doubles to lead Freeman. Jim McNaughton also had three hits. Austin Smidt and Ryan Mors also had home runs in the win. Ben Krush had four hits, including a double and a home

run, for Irene. Jeremy Rempop also homered for the Cardinals. Brett Scherschligt, the third Freeman pitcher, picked up the win. Simon Healy, who came on after Allan Scherschligt's leadoff homer in the ninth, took the loss. Freeman, 7-4 overall and 3-0 in SCL play, travels to Wynot to face the Expos Sunday. batting a collective .315 on the season. "One of the first things we've been talking about is having an idea at the plate, especially with our two-strike and two-out hitting," Schlingmen said. "Confidence always works best for me, so after the discus I thought, 'I'm going to win the shot put,' she said. "And after my first throw, I felt pretty good about it. Luckily it held up and I won, just like I've wanted to all season." The Gazelles also qualified two other athletes and a relay to today's (Saturday) final day at Howard Wood Field in Sioux Falls. Angie Dvorak (16.01) and Mikala Hora (16.28) advanced to the finals in the 100-meter hurdles, while Yankton's medley relay squad advanced with a preliminary clocking of 4:24.99. On the boys' side, Yankton qualified Perry Shafer in the 300-meter hurdles (40.87), as well as the 1600-meter relay (3:28.21) and medley relay (3:44.42). Shafer, a junior, said his performance in the 300 hurdles was one of his best races of his interrupted season — he was out two weeks with a sinus infection. "I felt as good as I have in a long time, and I'm just glad to advance," said Shafer, who will also compete in the pole vault. "It was fairly clean for me; I hit only two hurdles, I think. Hopefully I can do well (Saturday)." The state meet continues today as all three classes gather at Howard Wood Field, starting at 9
