'Share The Road' Kicks Off

SIoux FALLS — The South Dakota Safety Council announced today that it is joining with the South Dakota Department of Public Safety, federal and local highway safety, law enforcement, and motorcycle organizations in proclaiming May as Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month.

Motorists and other road users are reminded to safely "share the road" with motorcycles and to be extra alert to help keep motorcyclists safe. Motorcyclists are reminded to make themselves visible to other motorists. All road users are reminded to never drive, walk or bicycle while distracted.

"As the weather improves, more motorcyclists are hitting the roads," said Rick Kiley, director of the South Dakota Motorcycle Rider Education Program. "With that in mind, pedestrians, bicyclists and drivers of all vehicles need to be extra attentive and share the road. A motorcycle is one of the smallest vehicles on our roads, often hidden in another vehicle's blind spot. Everyone needs to aggressively look for them."

It's crucial that motorists and bicyclists always make a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots before entering or leaving a lane of traffic and at intersections. Pedestrians

should also scan for motorcyclists who might be hidden by other traffic.

"Motorcyclists have responsibilities, too," Kiley said. "They should follow the rules of the road, be alert to other drivers, never ride while impaired or distracted and always wear a Department of Transportation-compliant helmet and other protective gear."

Kiley said that a motorcyclist is far more vulnerable than a passenger vehicle occupant in the event of a crash. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration research shows that per vehicle mile traveled motorcyclists are about 37 times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in crashes.

Kiley offered several tips for drivers to help keep motorcyclists safe on our roadways:

- Remember, the motorcycle is a vehicle with all of the rights and privileges of any other motor vehicle on the roadway. Always allow a motorcyclist the full lane width — never try to share a lane;
- Always make a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots before entering or leaving a lane of traffic and at intersections;
- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic;
- Don't be fooled by a flashing

turn signal on a motorcycle — motorcycle signals are often not self-canceling and riders sometimes forget to turn them off. Wait to be sure the motorcycle is going to turn before you proceed;

• Allow more following distance, three or four seconds, when behind a motorcycle so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency. And don't tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars.

• Never drive while distracted. Kiley said motorcyclists can increase their safety by:

- Avoiding riding in poor weather conditions;
- Wearing brightly colored protective gear and a DOT-compliant helmet;
- Using turn signals for every turn or lane change, even if the rider thinks no one will see it;
- Combining hand signals and turn signals to draw more attention to themselves;
- Using reflective tape and stickers to increase conspicuity; and

• Positioning themselves in the lane where they will be most visible to other drivers.

• Never driving while impaired. Kiley's message to all drivers and motorcyclists is, "Help to share in the responsibility and do your part by safely sharing the road."

GOED Partners With South Dakota Companies To Create Internships

PIERRE — Thirty South Dakota companies from across the state are receiving grants from the South Dakota Governor's Office of Economic Development to create 80 internships through the Dakota Seeds internship program.

The overarching goal of Dakota Seeds is to provide South Dakota companies with a pipeline of well-qualified full-time employees, and provide students with solid job opportunities in South Dakota.

Of the Dakota Seeds funded participants who have graduated, 35 percent have returned to the business they interned with for full-time employment.

Area employers receiving grants include:

- Hebda Family Produce, Mission Hill;
- MASABA, Vermillion;
- Polaris Industries, Vermillion;
- Avalon Capital Group, North Sioux City.

The grants provide funding to assist with the internship wages. The grants cover up to one-half of a position's wages, with a maximum of \$2,000 for undergraduate or graduate student internships, \$8,000 for master's degree students, and \$10,000 for PhD students who are working as research and development assistants.

Dakota Seeds grants are funded by a partnership between the Governor's Office of Economic Development and the National Science Foundation's Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research and approved quarterly by the Workforce Development Council.

The Workforce Development Council was formed to plan and evaluate job training and education programs in South Dakota and to advise the governor on workforce issues. Members represent various business, labor and education interests.
