**Brown Bag Lunch Program To Be Held Friday**

Yankton's Dakota Territorial Museum will host a special Brown Bag Lunch program at noon this Friday on the topic "Celebrating 150 Years of Christ Episcopal Church," presented by Gert Boyles.

Christ Episcopal Church will celebrate 150 years. Boyles will talk about the history of the church and how the congregation plans to celebrate 150 years of faith in Yankton.

The presentation will be held in the conference room at the museum, located at 610 Summit.

**Missouri River Watershed School Festival Fri.**

Almost 400 students are expected to attend the Missouri River Watershed School Festival, set for Friday morning in Yankton.

Held in conjunction with the Missouri River Clean-Up on May 7, the festival will draw students from six area schools: Vermillion Middle School, Vermillion; Lynch Public School, Lynch, Neb.; Sacred Heart Middle School/seventh grade, Yankton; Laurel-Concord Public School/Advanced Biology class, Laurel, Neb.; Yankton Middle School/8th grade; and Crofton Public School Junior high class, Crofton, Neb.

Students will attend six 20-minute sessions during the morning. Each of the sessions are hands-on, showing students how to identify factors that can cause changes in stability of populations, communities and ecosystems along the Missouri River. The sessions also will focus on how organisms are linked to one another and the environment, the various structures and processes of the Earth system, and how human activity has changed the land, the river and the atmosphere. The students will have a "passport" with them and will need to have the presenter mark their passport to show that they attended. To receive the mark, students will need to answer a question about that presentation to show what they learned at each stop.

Some of the sessions include a stream table, a tank of the fish of the Missouri River, invasive species of the river, water quality demos, a rain simulator, ground water demo and the Missouri River Ecosystem Restoration Plan. There will also be presentations on the importance of water in Lakota life and realizing staterhood: conditions, challenges & personalities as South Dakota enters the Union in 1889.

The ages of students that are coming to the event will be seventh grade and up.

**BOARD OF TRADE**

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery rose 1.50 cents to \$7.9325 a bushel; July corn dropped 10.75 cents to \$7.2375 a bushel; July oats edged up 1 cent to \$3.44 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 29.25 cents to \$13.6375 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures traded down or flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle fell 1.35 cent to \$1.1060 a pound; August feeder cattle edged down 1.77 cent to \$1.3305 a pound; June lean hogs fell 3 cents to 92.47 cents a pound; while May pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2650 a pound.

"I'm happy they got him finally," said Spc. Leonard Paulson, who made his first deployment in four years as a National Guard member.

"But there will always be a threat," said Paulson, a welder by trade and a communications specialist in the unit. "I don't think al-Qaida will drop down because of that."

The 196th returned to the United States last week and was going through the demobilization process at Fort McCoy in Wisconsin when word came of bin Laden's death at a compound in Pakistan.

"It's a great feeling that that chapter is at least closed," said Maj. Corey Norris, a fulltime National Guard member in Rapid City who worked in law enforcement and firefighting during his deployment. "It gave me great satisfaction, even though we weren't directly responsible, that we as a unit supported those people and in that way had a part in the success."

It was the second deployment and the first overseas deployment for Norris.

"It was weird going from our safety and security and freedoms to see what little they have," he said. "It makes you appreciate what we have. It's uplifting to see the progress. You can see your effort is making a difference for the Afghans."

The brigade has made a successful transformation from an artillery unit four years ago to a unit that provides support for other troops in areas of security, training, supplies and housing. The role change required new training and new qualifications in what the state's adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Tim Reisch, called a "complicated reorganization" that produced a meritorious award for its work in Kabul.

"That is a testament to the leadership and the quality of soldiers in this unit," Reisch said.

It was the second deployment for 74 of the unit's members, the third deployment for 20, and the fourth deployment for five of them.

Reisch said 13 National Guard units of varying size in South Dakota could be called up by mid-2013.

**RTEC, KPI Chosen To Receive Grant Award**

The Regional Technical Education Center (RTEC) and Kolberg-Pioneer, Inc. (KPI) were recently notified that they were chosen to receive a \$12,850 Workforce Development Grant from the American Welding Society (AWS) Foundation, headquartered in Miami.

"We had a number of applications but those reviewing the grant requests felt that the impact your proposal will make on our industry and welding professionals was very worthy of our support."

The grant award comes as great news, according to RTEC General Manager Josh Svatos.

"It's a great opportunity for RTEC and Kolberg-Pioneer to recruit and train new students in the welding field," he said. "It also gives the students the chance to earn an AWS Welding Certification card."

News of the grant award was also welcomed at Kolberg-Pioneer, Inc. (KPI), a world-wide manufacturer of heavy equipment for the aggregate and recycle markets under the trade name of KPI-JCI.

"Our business volume has seen a steady increase during the past year, largely due to the global economy, especially in Latin American and Canada," according to Rhonda Kocer, Human Resources Manager at Kolberg-Pioneer.

Under the terms of the grant, RTEC and KPI will work together to recruit and select 10 individuals to participate in this special business-industry training partnership over the course of the next year.
