Amount Of Prescription Drugs Collected Increases

 The amount of prescription drugs gathered at various Yankton locations Saturday during a nationwide collection initiative increased over last year. When the event was held in September 2010, approximately 50 pounds of unwanted prescription drugs were collected. This time, more than 64 pounds were gathered. The Yankton Police Department, the Yankton County Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) organized the event locally. South Dakota saw the amount of prescription drugs collected rise from 551 pounds in September to 826 pounds Saturday. Nebraska's collection increased from 2,407 pounds to 3,959 pounds, and Iowa went from 1,569 pounds to 1,142 pounds. Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen said another event has not yet been scheduled but urged citizens to contact the DEA if they want the program to continue.

YPD Discounts Fake UPS Terrorism Email

 An email that urges readers to beware of terrorists posing as United Parcel Service employees is fake, according to the Yankton Police Department. Chief Brian Paulsen said Wednesday that the email, which claims to be from the Sioux Falls Police Department, is not real. It reads in part that, "There has been a huge purchase, \$32,000 worth, of United Parcel Service (UPS) uniforms on eBay over the last 30 days. If you have ANY questions when a UPS driver appears at your door they should be able to furnish VALID I.D." The Sioux Falls Police Department also issued a statement Wednesday declaring the email a fake.

One of the most notable projects occurring within the city limits this year will be overseen by the South Dakota Department of Transportation. Utility work is already being done to prepare for the launch of work on Eighth Street (or Highway 52) between Summit Street and West City Limits Road. It will include widening the lanes at the intersection of

Eighth and Summit streets, and replacing its aging traffic signal system. "They will keep the road open throughout the project, so there is no need for a complete detour," Kuhl said. "But locals will want to avoid the area when they can." He also stated that the railroad company is scheduled to repair the rough crossing at Cedar Street and Eighth Street sometime this month. That project has been delayed in the past, Kuhl said. Leyden hopes Yankton's citizens take pride in the work being done on the city's roads. "Their tax dollars are being put back into the community to keep up the infrastructure," he said. "We just ask the general public ... to be a little patient and plan in advance if you have to take a detour. Be considerate of barricades and signage. If something is closed, stay out. It is closed for a reason."

 them with their personal issues it makes it easier." As a "thank you" to Gertsema, Frank brought along a gift for the classroom, which she hopes in turn will become a gift for the community: a copy for each member of the class of "Nickels, Dimes, and Dollars: A Wise Kid's Guide to Money Matters." "At McGraw-Hill we decided to focus on this whole issue of financial solvency and financial literacy," she said to the Press and Dakotan after her time with the class. "We just know that there were too many young people graduating and too many adults who don't understand how to invest, how to save, how to manage money, so we felt this was important. We also know that how the twig is bent is how the

tree will grow, so we felt we needed to start this program early on." In giving the book, she hopes that she can help change the culture of the community. "(McGraw-Hill managers) had seen this book; in fact, it is one that our corporate giving group decided to buy just to give away," Frank said. "Sometimes kids spend their money on all kinds of things — it is ridiculous. Or worse yet, their parents have no idea how to manage money. There are a lot of lessons for adults in this book. It is designed to be completed with a parent." Frank said the way the book is designed has been well received by schools and parents alike. "After we have given the books to schools, they have contacted us saying they wanted to buy the book, and we had to tell them we don't sell it, (that) we bought it to give to them. It is not something we make any money on," she said. "If people knew

how to manage their money better, we wouldn't have had so many people buying houses that they couldn't afford. So we need to learn to have a dream that we can take care of and work towards the next dream." Frank said one thing she will always remember about her visit to the Yankton School is the warmth of the atmosphere. "You walk into this school and — unlike if you walk into a big city school, where you have to be signed in and scanned and escorted — this is just you walking into the school and you are very comfortable and very accepting," she said. "You can see this is a very warm, friendly place. The kids, teachers they are a family of learners. I love that. I will be thinking about this wonderful guy I met in a different country and you get to see other people differently because of looking through their eyes. This creates a family. Now, you are all part of my family."

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery fell 21.25 cents to \$7.72 a bushel; July corn gained 5.75 cents to \$7.2950 a bushel; July oats edged up 2 cents to \$3.46 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 11.75 cents to \$13.52 a bushel. Beef and pork futures traded down or flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle fell 0.05 cent to \$1.1055 a pound; August feeder cattle edged down 0.13 cent to \$1.3292 a pound; June lean hogs fell 0.32 cent to 92.15 cents a pound; while May pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2650 a pound.
