Horton Honored With Jackson Award

VERMILLION — Professor Thomas J. Horton is the 2011 recipient of the John Wesley Jackson Outstanding Faculty Award at The University of South Dakota School of Law. Horton was nominated by students and faculty at the Law School. "Tom Horton, as the newest faculty member (2009), immediately began demonstrating his dedication as a classroom and courtroom teacher and legal scholar," said Dean Barry R. Vickrey. "He works effectively with students, whose improvement is constant and discipline is evident each semester. The USD School of Law School is fortunate to have him as a member of our faculty and he is a deserving recipient of the Jackson Award." Horton received a J.D. degree from Case Western Reserve University, his M.A.L.S. (American Studies) from Georgetown University, and a B.A. in biological sciences from Harvard University. He is a member of The Order of the Coif. His memberships, admissions and appointments include the Ohio State Bar, the District of Columbia Bar and the District of Columbia Federal Civil Pro Bono Panel. In 1990, he was appointed by Rhode Island to serve as Assistant Special Counsel to investigate the collapse of RISDIC - insured financial institutions. Throughout his career, Horton has organized, chaired, and taught courses on trial and litigation skills, including deposition skills for the National Institute for Trial Advocacy (NITA) and he has served as a judge in the National Intercollegiate Mock Trial Competition.

Prior to joining South Dakota's Law School faculty, Horton spent 28 years litigating and trying antitrust and complex civil cases in federal courts throughout the United States. His career includes governmental stints with the U.S. Department of Justice's Antitrust Division and the Federal Trade Commission, and private practice as a partner with several major international law firms in the District of Columbia, including Howrey & Simon, and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP. He has been active in a variety of civic organizations and boards, including managing little league baseball teams, coaching Odyssey of the Mind, and tutoring juvenile inmates. Horton is married with four children and moved to Vermillion from Falls Church, Va.

The Jackson Award was established in 1981 through a gift by Horace and Dorothy Jackson of Rapid City, S.D., in honor of members of the Jackson family. Selection is based on criteria demonstrating excellence in the teaching of law, including effectiveness in the classroom; efforts to improve legal education in ways that serve the needs of the profession and of South Dakota; research and writing; contributions to the profession through public service; and contributions to the academic environment of the Law School.

record is well-aligned with that," he said. "Under Horizon's management, we're able to keep the clinic alive and provide patients with even better care and value."

Horizon wanted to help keep medical offerings in Springfield, said chief executive officer John Mengershausen. "The main focus is a community health center," he said. "Without the access to health care services, a community will fold up and die. We want to be able to keep these services available in the Springfield community."

The City of Springfield owns the building that the clinic occupies, and Horizon leases it from the city, Atkinson said. The lease agreement signed is for five years at \$0, she said.

Horizon purchased the clinic's equipment, inventory and accounts receivable, Atkinson said. The network hired all existing staff, including Drs. Kerr and Kathy Miller.

Horizon was approached by Kerr and the City of Springfield, and the purchase came after six to eight months of in-depth conversation, Atkinson said.

Horizon's network allows the Springfield clinic's staff to serve patients with access to a wider range of health services, Atkinson said. Employing more than 100 professional staff, the Horizon network will receive more than 63,000 patient visits and maintain an annual budget of more than \$8 million.

"With 15 clinics, there is quite a range of experienced providers with different expertise to serve their patients," she said.

The Springfield clinic will continue focusing on family medicine and also provide pediatrics, emergency care, X-ray and lab services, Atkinson said. In addition, the clinic will offer access to specialists through telemedicine.

"The clinic is equipped with high-resolution cameras in the examination rooms," she said. "If patients can't travel, the specialists come to them."

The clinic will also make use of electronic medical records, which is part of the transition, Atkinson said. Billing is done from a central office.

The clinic can refer patients to both Avera and Sanford Health systems for care, such as cardiology and oncology, unavailable at the Springfield clinic, she said. Emergencies outside of clinic hours should call or go to Avera Sacred Heart Hospital in Yankton at (605) 668-8000 or dial 911.

Goyeneche Wins Cancer Research Award At USD

VERMILLION — Alicia A. Goyeneche, Ph.D., a member of the Sanford School of Medicine of The University of South Dakota faculty, received a Minority Scholar in Cancer Research Award at the 102nd annual meeting of the American Association for Cancer Research, April 2-6.

Goyeneche is a research instructor of basic biomedical sciences. She was recognized as a Minority Scholar in Cancer Research for her research on subjects such as the growth of cancer cells and ways to improve the efficacy of combination treatments for cancer. Goyeneche is passionate about cancer research because of "those (people) that are already its victims, those that are giving big battles to it and those who are trying to decipher it with the intention to finally overcome the disease." Additionally, she credited her mentor Carlos Telleria, Ph.D., associate professor of basic biomedical sciences, for supervising her work. A member of the Sanford School of Medicine faculty since 2002, Goyeneche received her Ph.D. from the University of San Luis in Argentina.

The Minority Scholar in Cancer Research Award is sponsored by a grant from the National Cancer Institute's Center to Reduce Cancer Health Disparities. Now in its 26th year, the Center is intended to enhance the education and training of minority researchers and increase the visibility and recognition of minorities involved in cancer research. Scholars are chosen from minority institutions and the larger bodies of universities, colleges and research institutions, based on their qualifications, references from mentors, and an estimation of professional benefit.

mile radius and offers financial assistance for uninsured and underinsured patients through the Sliding Fee Program, Atkinson said.

The clinic will see patients covered by Medicare and Medicaid, according to Horizon officials. The clinic is a preferred provider for Avera and Sanford Health Plans, as well as many other insurance companies.

Patients who have insurance could also qualify for care on a sliding-fee basis, Atkinson said. The clinic uses federal poverty guidelines to determine the sliding fee for a particular service.

According to Atkinson, 75 percent of Horizon's annual budget comes from patient insurance and paying patients. The remaining 25 percent is funded by a Federal Community Health Center grant. That funding comes from the Bureau of Primary Health Care, a division of U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

"This (grant) funding allows Horizon to offset the costs of providing reduced patient fees through the sliding-fee program," she said.

As the Horizon transition moves forward, Springfield Medical Clinic patients will find they can continue receiving needed care locally, Atkinson said.

"It's convenient and community based," she said. "Patients can stay close to home, and they find it reassuring."

USD Law School Hooding Ceremony Honors 2011 Grads

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota will honor graduates from the USD School of Law with a Hooding Ceremony at 5:30 p.m. in Sagle Hall Auditorium on Friday, May 6.

Thomas J. Erickson, vice president, Government and Industry Affairs for Bunge North America and a 1987 graduate of the USD School of Law, will provide the keynote address. Erickson represents the interests of Bunge North America and Bunge Limited in the United States, Canada and Mexico on matters of public

policy. Prior to joining Bunge, Erickson served as a commissioner at the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC), where he was one of five commissioners responsible for overseeing the U.S. futures and option markets. A member of the State Bar of South Dakota and of the District of Columbia Bar, Erickson was nominated CFTC Commissioner by President Bill Clinton in February 1999 and confirmed by the U.S. Senate to a four-year term.

A native of Sioux Falls, Erick-

son received a B.A. in government and international affairs from Augustana College and a J.D. from the USD School of Law. Following law school, Erickson served as legislative assistant to U.S. Sen. Thomas A. Daschle, D-S.D. Prior to joining the CFTC, Erickson was assistant to the president/legal counsel at the National Grain Trade Council (NGTC). As legal counsel to the NGTC, he represented the grain trade and futures markets on matters of agricultural policy, futures trading, international trade,

grain quality and tax issues.
