don't own our own convertible, so we plan to ride our motorcycles in parades, or at least one of them." Brooks said he looked forward to serving as Captain for another reason. Riverboat Days can unify area residents following the controversial May 24 opt-out election for the Yankton School District, he said.

"After the opt-out, we need to come together as a community," he said. "By focusing on Riverboat Days, we can bring everyone together."

The community shows an eagerness to do what it takes to make Riverboat Days a success, Joan said.

"Riverboat Days makes such great use of all volunteers," she said. "There have been some members who have been on the committee since its inception."

The Schilds were officially introduced as Captain and Belle prior to Saturday's exhibition baseball game between the Sioux Falls Fighting Pheasants and Sioux City Explorers at Riverside Park.

The Schilds view themselves as ambassadors not only for Riverboat Days but for Yankton. They already plan to appear at Czech Days in Tabor and Danish Days in Viborg, along with events in other surrounding communities.

"We hope to go to the Chicken Show at Wayne (Neb.)," Joan said with a chuckle, noting the unusual nature of the festival.

The Schilds are particularly looking forward to maintaining a family tradition. They will attend the annual Tabor fireworks display honoring Brooks' late brother, Rich.

Rich Schild was killed December 2005 in Iraq by a roadside bomb. He was serving with Brooks as part of the Yankton-based Charlie Battery of the 1st Battalion, 147th Field Artillery of the South Dakota National Guard.

"We go (for the fireworks) every year. This year, it's on June 16 and falls on our 27th wedding anniversary. I think Rich would like that," Brooks said. "It's also special that Joan and I will be in the Czech Days parade, which he always enjoyed."

The Schilds consider the military presence an important part of Riverboat Days.

Brooks joined the Army National Guard in Council Bluffs, Iowa, in 1990 and currently serves with Charlie Battery in Yankton. He deployed to Baghdad in 2005 and to Kuwait in 2009 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. He currently serves as the unit's public affairs officer.

Joan has led the Charlie Battery family readiness group during the two deployments. She currently serves with the state family readiness program.

When not deployed, Brooks served with Charlie Battery soldiers on Guard detail and grounds patrol throughout the Riverboat Days weekend. Joan and the Charlie Battery Family Readiness Group entered floats in the parade over the past six years.

The Schilds are both educators in the Yankton School District. Brooks teaches eighth grade science at Yankton Middle School. He also coaches football and track at Yankton High School and Science Olympiad at the middle school. Joan is a special education teacher at Stewart Elementary School.

The Schilds, who were married in Yankton in 1984, have three children. Blake, 22, attends the University of South Dakota and works for Steamway Cleaning. Jordan, 20,

also attends USD and works for South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks. Clara, 16, is a sophomore at Yankton High School and is involved with track and Science Olympiad.

The Schilds and their three children have participated at Riverboat Days through Scouting, 3-on-3 basketball, dance and the parade.

The Schilds said they weren't expecting to be named Captain and Belle.

"We were surprised," Joan said. "We got a call from Marlene Johnson and were told that people were coming over (to visit). I picked up the house and made something for them to drink. We didn't know what to expect, but we never thought it was for Captain and Belle."

Brooks said he remains stunned at the attention. "We want to tell people that being selected for Captain and Belle is both an honor and humbling," he said.

The Schilds fought not to tell anybody until Saturday's announcement.

"We were told (of our selection) about a month ago," she said. "We were told to keep it a secret. We didn't tell our kids for the first three weeks."

Brooks admitted his opening pitch before Saturday's game wasn't exactly a work of art. "My pitch was just like (heaving) the shot put, but at least it went across the plate," he said with a grin.

The Schilds say they look forward to a busy summer promoting Riverboat Days and what promises to be a fun-filled celebration weekend.

"All the Riverboat Days people are good people," Brooks said. "It's a good event that brings 100,000 people to Yankton. It's important to the community that we keep it going strong."

be slower to fall. It's even possible prices will rise at some stations in coming days even if they decline nationally.

And after the galloping surge in prices this year, many gas station owners are reluctant to lower prices until they see their competition doing the same, Rozell said.

"It's just the nature of the business," he said. "They're going to try to get the most they can."

Station owners still feel bruised from their own higher costs earlier this year. In some cases, their suppliers raised prices so quickly that station owners couldn't pass along those higher costs to consumers fast enough. Competition also makes it hard for some stations to raise prices.

"So station owners will be watching each other this summer," Rozell said. "When one guy drops, so will the other."

A drop in prices would take some pressure off struggling consumers as well as businesses. As prices soared this year, surveys showed that motorists started to drive less. MasterCard SpendingPulse said this past week that it had recorded its sixth straight week of declining gasoline consumption.

That's a cautionary sign for the economy, because most drivers conserve fuel only after curbing spending on other discretionary items like furniture, computers and vacations.

Over the past month, gas prices have risen 36 cents a gallon in Columbus, Ohio, to \$4.10. Steve Garrett has felt it. He's scrapped a summer trip to Myrtle Beach, Fla. And the bakery distribution center where he works has begun closing sites and laying off staff to save fuel on bread and pastry shipments.

City To Reorganize, Select Mayor Tonight

The Yankton City Commission will welcome its new members and select a mayor for the next year tonight (Monday).

Jake Hoffner, Craig Sommer and Nancy Wenande will be sworn in for three-year terms.

Following that, the commission has a short agenda with a public hearing to consider assessments for snow removal from public sidewalks, a conditional-use permit hearing for a daycare facility, a bid award for a water main replacement project on Park Street, and an executive session to consult with legal counsel about proposed litigation or contractual matters.

The meeting gets under way at 7 p.m. in the City of Yankton Meeting Room, located at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

If a farm is valued at \$100,000, the owner currently pays approximately \$826.30 per year in property taxes that go to the school district. The opt-out would increase that rate approximately \$63 per year.

For 2011, the levy on commercial property is approximately \$14.207 per \$1,000 of assessed property. If the opt-out were enacted at maximum funding, it would mean an additional \$5.39 per \$1,000.

If a business is valued at \$100,000, the owner currently pays approximately \$1,420.70 per year in property taxes that go to the school district. The opt-out would increase that rate approximately \$539 per year.
