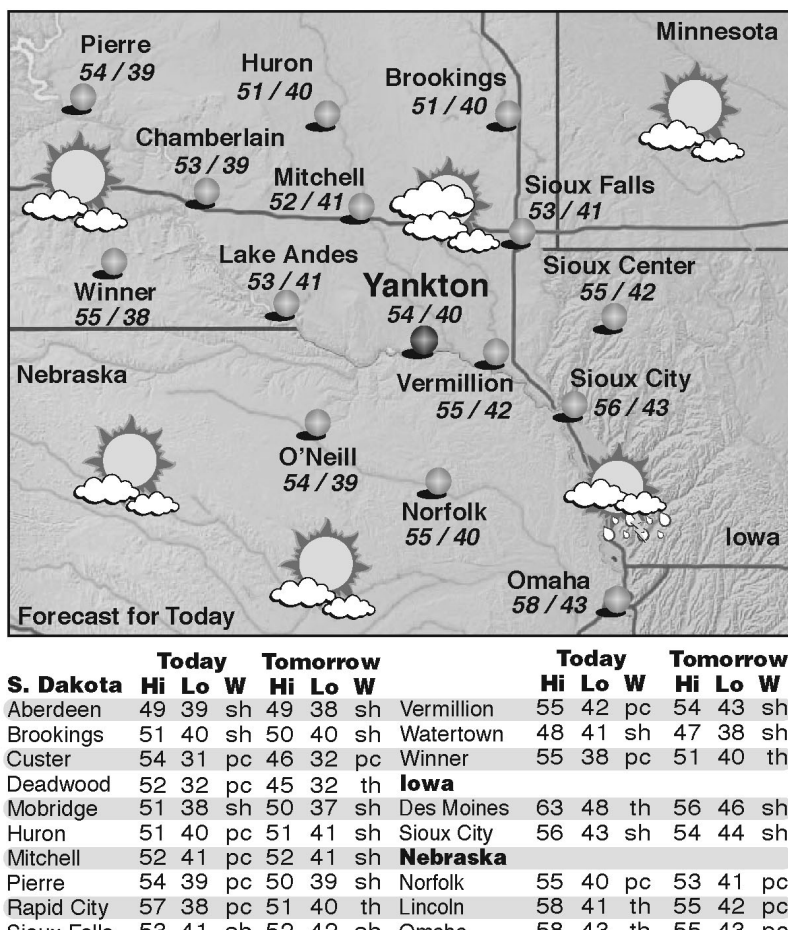

ance that he posted it on his website earlier this week — before the deal was finalized Thursday morning.

"Ty's booking agent jumped the gun," Lambertz said with a chuckle. "But (the agent) said, 'We were so sure that this was a done deal that we put it on our website.'"

Lambertz admitted that he likewise thought the concert would become reality.

"After talking with his booking agent, I got a really good feeling," he said. "I am very pleased that the (LCTC) board allowed me to book this act."

The Yankton booking came together extremely quickly compared to the normal schedule for entertainers, Lambertz said.

"This all happened in seven days, from when the booking agent contacted me to the signing of the contract and faxing it back," he said. "In comparison, this tour was set three months out."

So why was the Yankton date added at the last minute?

The booking agent was looking at what is known in the business as a "tweener" concert, Lambertz said. Those concerts, often held at smaller venues, are booked to fill gaps in a national tour, he said.

In the end, it was all about good timing and the attractiveness of Dakota Theater, Lambertz said.

"They were looking at something between two dates on the national tour," he said. "The booking agent was looking at available sites and saw a picture of Dakota Theater on our website (www.lctcyankton.com)."

The Yankton theater's photo and location caught the booking agent's eye, Lambertz said.

"(The agent) liked the look of the theater and its availability for a twener concert. And the date fell during the middle of his (national) tour," Lambertz said. "The agent said that Ty is excited about playing a small town. And Ty likes to play intimate settings, like Dakota Theater."

There's also a financial consideration for Herndon, Lambertz said.

"The group is on the road, and they continue to have expenses. They want to fill their schedule so they at least cover some of the expenses on their 'down' days," the LCTC executive director said.

Lambertz said he actively promotes Dakota Theater for "tweener" dates. He knows the importance of the dates from another perspective.

"I formerly worked for 15 years with Columbia Artists Management in New York City. I worked with orchestras, dance companies and other entertainers," he said.

"While I was with the New York City company, I worked with the Hungarian State Folk Ensemble. We had 104 people on the road, and we had three open dates where we booked two shows to cover part of the expenses."

Herndon brings a string of suc-

cesses to the Dakota Theater stage. He has 17 singles that have hit the country-western charts. He has three No. 1 hits and 10 hits that have landed in the Top 10.

Herndon recently signed a new recording deal with FUNL Music, according to his website. The Nashville label announced Herndon as its flagship artist and released to radio "Journey On," the title single from his upcoming fourth album.

His albums "What Mattered Most" and "Living In A Moment" have been certified Gold by the Recording Industry Association of America.

Herndon co-wrote the song "When We Fly" which won the 2010 Dove Award for Bluegrass Recorded Song of the Year. He recorded the song as a duet with Lizzy Long.

In addition, he was nominated for a 2011 Grammy Award for Best Southern, Country or Bluegrass Gospel album.

According to Herndon's website, "Journey On" is being heralded as the most personal project of his career, due in large part to the fact that the CD represents his first foray into songwriting.

"The people who believed in me and my talent made me even more serious about writing this album," he said. "There was so much I wanted to say to fit where I find myself spiritually and emotionally, and I wanted to sing about that."

The songs on this project reflect the personal challenges and struggles Herndon has faced and conquered, as well as bring the lis-

tenor the promise of hope and new beginnings, according to his website.

The album's title track will serve as the first single and is impacting radio now, the website said. Herndon began touring in support of the project in June 2010.

In promoting the Yankton concert, Lambertz has already contacted two country-western clubs with more than 1,000 members on their websites. Two Yankton country-western radio stations are co-sponsoring the local concert, and Lambertz plans to reach an audience from about an 85-mile radius.

The Herndon concert concludes a busy month for LCTC. The company is performing "The History of Yankton, A Pageant," June 4-5 at the Riverside Park amphitheater as part of Yankton's 150th anniversary celebration. LCTC will then perform three weekends of "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum" for three weeks June 9-26.

"We have a complete new sound system that will be ready for our June 9 performance and for use when Ty arrives," Lambertz said. "We also have 12 headsets for the hearing impaired."

The Herndon appearance could mark just the beginning of similar concerts, Lambertz said.

"If we have good attendance, we could get more shows of this caliber," he said. "Booking agents talk to each other. If there is good support for this show, we could have the ability to book more acts in the future."

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mostly higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
 Wheat for July delivery dropped 23.50 cents to \$7.3550 a bushel; July corn gained 3.25 cents to \$6.8050 a bushel; July oats gained 5 cents to \$3.47 a bushel; while July soybeans gained 11 cents to \$13.4275 a bushel. Beef and pork futures traded mostly higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
 June live cattle gained 0.80 cent to \$1.0985 a pound; August feeder cattle edged up 0.90 cent to \$1.3392 a pound; June lean hogs gained 0.98 cent to 94.20 cents a pound; while May pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2650 a pound.

"One thing they shouldn't expect is people throwing punches," she stated. "I keep getting older people telling me that when they watched roller derbies growing up, there were a bunch of fist fights. It's

more about skill than physical violence."
 The nicknames taken on by roller derby teammates — Steel Bullitt Stella, T-Vicious and Felony Convixen just to give some examples from the Roller Dames roster — probably feed into that popular impression of a violent sport. However, Barnett said she got involved because it looked fun and would be something to keep her active. It has also helped her grow as a person.

"I'm not one of the tough people who is very aggressive," she said. "I'm more of the shy person. Now that I've been in derby, I'm more open and out there."
 The Roller Dames advertise the mixer as their last bout of the season within a 300-mile radius.
 The local band Captain Krouton and the Flying Apes will be playing live music during the bout. There will also be a half-time performance by Judi's Dance Studio.

Tickets for the event can be purchased from KDAM Radio in Yankton or at the door on the day of the bout.

for the school — that is going to be five different funds including the bond redemption — currently, using home owners as an example, they pay \$9.676 per \$1,000.

That is for the 2010-2011 tax year. That is the taxes that people are paying right now. The amount of opt-out tax raises it \$2.98 per \$1,000.
 Bietz said that the school board has elected to put off scheduled capital outlay expenditures planned in the next two school years, such as bus replacement, vehicle replacement and other maintenance items in order

to reduce the Capital Outlay levy by \$1 per \$1,000 reducing the amount taken for the Capital Outlay fund to \$2 per \$1,000. That makes the net increase of the opt-out to homeowners \$1.98 per \$1,000 as reported. By reducing the Capital Outlay fund while the YHS/SAC redemption bonds are still on the books, the net result for the taxpayers is to reduce the amount of the total levies on

property by \$1 per \$1,000.
 "Essentially, of the five funds the school board has the authority to tax, we are using the Capital Outlay in the short term to drive down the amount of the opt-out."
 He added that when the bond redemption fund levy falls off the books, the district will then realign its Capital Outlay levy to then be able to address the items that had been delayed.
