



## Nebraska's Sadler: Aggies Haven't Called About Job

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — It looks like Nebraska's Doc Sadler is staying put. Sadler said Friday in a text message to The Associated Press that no one from Texas A&M has contacted him about the Aggies' men's basketball coaching job. Sadler was named in media reports as a possible candidate to replace Mark

Turgeon, who was hired by Maryland this week. Sadler also was connected to openings at Texas Tech and Oklahoma. Sadler is 89-71 in five seasons in Lincoln, 30-50 in Big 12 games. The Huskers enter the Big Ten next season.

Last month, Sadler received a contract extension through 2015-16. Nebraska athletic director Tom Osborne on Thursday dismissed fan criticism of Sadler's record and extension, saying, "If people around here don't like him, there are plenty of other schools that'll take him."

## Millrose Games Moving Uptown

NEW YORK (AP) — The Millrose Games are moving uptown. The longtime indoor track meet that has become a fixture at Madison Square Garden will be held next year at the Fort Washington Avenue Armory. The smaller building in the upper Manhattan neighborhood of Washington Heights is home to a year-round track and field center run by New Balance. It's recognized as one of the top indoor venues in the United States and hosts more than 100 meets a year. One of those meets in 2011 was the Great West Conference Indoor Track and Field Championships, swept by the University of South Dakota. At the Garden, some of the world's best athletes ran on a temporary track that was installed for the meet and would soon be broken down to make way for the Westminster Kennel Club dog show that usually follows it, along with Knicks and Rangers games. The 105th Millrose meet is Jan. 28.

## Dayton, Lawmakers Huddle Over Vikings Site

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Gov. Mark Dayton and several key Cabinet members met behind closed doors Friday with legislative backers of a new stadium for the Minnesota Vikings, trying to figure out how to make the team's site choice in suburban Arden Hills viable in the waning days of the legislative session. Several participants in the meeting said talks centered on the Ramsey County site. Rep. Morrie Lanning, the Moorhead Republican carrying the bill in the House, said that's because the Vikings have made it their clear choice over rebuilding at the current Metrodome site in Minneapolis. But the Ramsey County site is presenting challenges, given the May 23 deadline to adjourn the legislative session. Lanning said there's still a lack of clarity over the exact cost of needed road repairs around the site — costs that threaten to push the total state spending commitment well above a \$300 million ceiling that Dayton and legislators insist is set in stone. "The governor, Sen. Rosen and I

are all on the same page with the fact that the \$300 million is the state's limit and that has to cover whatever transportation costs need to be incurred there," said Lanning, referring to the bill's chief Senate sponsor, Republican Julie Rosen of Fairmont. The deal struck earlier this week between the Vikings and Ramsey County leaders split costs for the \$1.1 billion, retractable-roof stadium between the team \$407 million; the county at \$350 million; and the state at \$300 million — plus the cost of transportation improvements. But those added costs are turning out to be the rub. A state Department of Transportation estimate pegged transportation spending needs in the area to be at least \$175 million, but Vikings and Ramsey County officials believe that's too high. They also argue most of those improvements would have to happen in the next few years anyway, with or without the stadium. Dayton's transportation and budget commissioners were both in the meeting in the governor's

Capitol office, and Lanning and Rosen said afterward they're hoping to soon receive a new transportation analysis that all the interested parties can agree on. "We need to start getting some questions answered before we can really start moving on this thing," Rosen said. Rosen said she also wants the team to explain why it opted to back a retractable-roof stadium over a more economical fixed roof. The written agreement between the team and Ramsey County released this week raised the possibility that the team could decide to switch to a fixed roof if the retractable one turns out to be too expensive; under the agreement any savings realized from that switch would come off the Vikings' share. Dayton affirmed that he and the bill sponsors are united on the issue of the state's commitment. "We agreed that \$300 million is the state share and it's going to be limited to that," he said. "We're going to make that once again clear to the Vikings."

## Rangers Forward Boogaard Dead At 28

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers enforcer Derek Boogaard has died. He was 28. The team announced Boogaard's death on Friday night, but gave no details. "Derek was an extremely kind

and caring individual," Rangers president and general manager Glen Sather said. "He was a very thoughtful person, who will be dearly missed by all those who knew him. We extend our deepest sympathies to his family, friends and teammates

during this difficult time." Boogaard signed a four-year, \$6.5 million deal with Rangers in July and appeared in 22 games with them last season. He had a goal and an assist to go with 45 penalty minutes.

for pictures. It is the same distance from home plate, 520 feet, as that longest home run Killebrew ever hit. His No. 3 jersey is retired, and a replica will be in Minnesota's dugout for the rest of the season. There's a statue in his likeness outside the ballpark, too, and two roses were left near the base of the statue on Friday. Right fielder Michael Cuddyer said the players want to wear the 1961 throwback jerseys for every home game the rest of the season in Killebrew's honor. Killebrew has maintained a regular presence around the Twins over the years. He made an effort to get to know all the current players, striking

particularly close friendships with Cuddyer, Justin Morneau and Jim Thome among others. "I never watched him play. The only way I do know him is as a mentor, as a genuine person," Cuddyer said. "He was a father figure to pretty much everybody he met. That says it all." Gardenhire said one of his favorite memories was seeing Killebrew walk in his office in full uniform in spring training a few years ago after the manager had invited him to join the team. "He was excited and ready to go," Gardenhire said. "He asked me, 'What do you want? What do you need me to do?'" I said, "Just be you," and that's what he did." His nickname, "The Killer," defied his humble, gentle demeanor, but he sure could crush a baseball with that big bat of his. "I didn't have evil intentions,"

Killebrew once said, "but I guess I did have power." His home run totals turned out to be that much more impressive, given the smaller parks, watered-down pitching staffs and juiced balls and players that came in the decades after he retired. Though Killebrew has been passed in recent years by Alex Rodriguez and Thome on the homer list to fall out of the top 10, he ought to be in 11th place for some time, particularly as dominant young pitchers have taken control of this post-steroid era in baseball. With Manny Ramirez's sudden retirement last month, the next closest active players are Vladimir Guerrero and Chipper Jones with 440. Albert Pujols, with 415 homers at age 31, might be the next threat to reach Killebrew's mark.
