USD History Professor To Address National Guard Logisticians

VERMILLION — Steven Bucklin, Ph.D., a professor in the department of history at The University of South Dakota, will address more than 1,200 logisticians as a guest speaker at the 2011 Army National Guard Logistics Management Seminar, May 16-20, in Palm Springs, Calif.

Bucklin's speech, entitled "Back to the Basics: U.S. Foreign Policy and the Army National Guard," addresses America's current foreign policy of promoting democracy abroad and how that policy has changed the traditional role of the National Guard. He is one of four guest speakers who will examine lessons learned from Vietnam, the Persian Gulf and the Cold War era.

"When John Quincy Adams was Secretary of State under President Monroe, he believed it was none of our business to get

involved in political affairs abroad," said Bucklin, who has been a USD faculty member since 1996. That philosophy changed, according to Bucklin, during the Spanish-American War. Another turning point for the National Guard was World War I when state militias, as National Guard units were known back then, began to be more integrated with the regular armed forces.

Bucklin's history with the National Guard is twofold. He was a member of the South Dakota National Guard and he documented the history of the South Dakota National Guard in his book, "From Cold War to Gulf War: The

South Dakota National Guard, 1945 to the Millennium."

"There's a tradition of service in my family," stated Bucklin, who has both a B.A. and M.A. from USD and a Ph.D. from the University of Iowa. "My father served in the Navy during World War II and my brother served in the Army during the Vietnam Era."

Today, Bucklin is educating USD students on U.S. Diplomatic and Contemporary American History as well as Historical Methods. He has published several articles and books on historical topics, including his background in the Army National Guard and American Foreign Policy. His newest book, "Going Places: A History of the South Dakota Department of Transportation," is scheduled to be completed later this year.

But while Josh will be heading to Sioux Falls in June to work as a nurse for Avera McKennan Hospital, Nick will make his way to St. Louis in August to study optometry.

"That will be the first time we've really been farther than the hallway apart," Wenande said, referring to the fact that Nick lived across the hall from him while attending MMC. "It will be an interesting time for sure."

Josh Wenande, 22, and a Mitchell native, excelled in MMC's nursing program. Earlier this year, he was the college's nomination for the Nursing Students Association of South Dakota's Outstanding Nursing Student. A handful of nursing

schools in the state nominate one of their students based on academics, abilities, personal qualities and campus involvement.

He was selected to share the award with Dakota Wesleyan University student Pauna Mirkovic.

"You read the credentials of some of the other kids, and it was definitely a humbling experience to have been named the outstanding nurse of South Dakota," Wenande said. "I was lucky to receive the award. It reaffirms all the hard work you've put in for four years."

In retrospect, he is happy he followed the advice of his sister, Jena, to pursue a nursing degree. "The nursing program is so interactive, and you get to touch people's lives while you're in school," Wenande said. "That makes you excited when you get to go out and do that on your own."

And while he is looking forward to beginning his job in Sioux Falls, Wenande said he will also be thrilled to see Nick starting his new life.

"It will be different because we've always been so competitive," Wenande said. "That was one reason we wanted to go to college together: to make sure we were pushing each other and achieving in academics and baseball as we would like. He is a big reason for a lot of my success, and I would like to think that part of the reason he is so successful is due to our competition. It's not about, 'I got a better grade than you.' It's about working hard and keeping the main goals in sight."

The two brothers had never really discussed going to the same college, he explained.

"We knew we wanted to stay together and go to a small college," Wenande said. "It was just kind of understood."

After investigating several area colleges and universities, they settled on MMC.

Wenande was convinced by his sister to pursue a nursing degree like she had done rather than become a veterinarian or crime scene investigator like he had contemplated doing in high school. He thought he would like to be a nurse anesthetist.

Meanwhile, Nick pursued a biochemistry degree.

Josh was a catcher, and Nick was a pitcher. Both wanted to play baseball in college.

MMC offered them the opportunity to do everything they wanted.

"It was a perfect place," Wenande said. "Nick and I were a family, and we joined another family. That's what was nice about it. It was like we never left home."

While the college was small, it still gave them room to go their

separate ways.

"Before we'd taken the same classes and done everything the same," Wenande said. "It was a big stretch for me to grow personally and get my own path. Before, it was the 'Wenande twins.' Now, it is more Nick and Josh. We lived across from each other in the dorms, so we didn't get too far from each other, but we did have time to grow up and develop into our own persons."

He said he is grateful to the foundation MMC has provided him to begin a life outside of education.

"Mount Marty is so different from any other college in that you get so close to your professors and the kids you go to school with because there are so few of us," Wenande said. "It's a nice little community. When you look back on the four years, it's been a pretty awesome experience."

QUESTION: What cuts has the school district made in reaction to the cuts to state aid funding?

ANSWER: Per the school district handout released at the April 26 public forum, the district has eliminated the following programs and staff for the school year 2011-2012:

- non-renewal/reduction in

force of 24 teaching positions (Clarification: Some positions at the elementary level, included as cuts, are due to cuts to federal programing, they will be reinstated if federal funding is made available to the district.);

- elimination of 11 non-certified positions;
- elimination of one administrative position;
- elimination of all grades 5-8 activities;
- freeze salaries for all district employees;
- across-the-board reduction of remaining activity budget,

classroom supplies, travel, memberships/affiliations, custodial services and transportation.

The cuts represent a savings of \$2,142,920 for the district.

QUESTION: Why doesn't the school district just do a 1 percent sales tax to make up the difference in the budget and funding?

ANSWER: By state law, the Yankton School Board does not have the statutory authority to initiate a sales tax. Only legislative action can authorize a municipality to assess and collect local optional sales tax.
