**DWU Volleyball To Host Youth, High School, Team Camps**

MITCHELL — Dakota Wesleyan University volleyball coach Eric Viney and the volleyball team are gearing up for its annual summer camps and there is still space available for interested athletes.

The Tigers host a youth camp and a high school skills camp Wednesday and Thursday June 8-9. The youth camp runs from 8 a.m. until noon each day with check in at 7:30 a.m. The camp is open to volleyball players entering third through eighth grade. The camp is designed to teach and help players develop volleyball skills as well as the rules of volleyball. Each camper will receive a T-shirt.

The high school skills camp is from 1 to 5 p.m. each day with check in at 12:30 p.m. The camp is open to volleyball players en-

When it came down to finally choosing to play volleyball for the Lancers, Anderson admitted that she didn't realize her high school teammate, Ray, made the same decision.

"Actually, I didn't know Heather was going for volleyball until I saw the story in the paper, so I thought that was cool," Anderson said. "I hadn't talked to her much, and so it was kind of like, 'Wow, that's good to know.'"

Anderson recorded 162 kills as a senior for the Gazelles volleyball team, which finished the 2010 season 10-12. She ranked 15th in Class AA in kills per game (2.16) and finished her career at YHS with 356 kills.

While the track programs at MMC already boasts three former Yankton athletes, the volleyball team now has two in-town players to add to a roster that already features area standouts Emily Schreuer (Alcester-Hudson) and Kerry McDonald (Parker).

"We have a high school and college in this community, why aren't we bringing more students over?," Climer asked, rhetorically. "Most freshmen want to go off far away, but if we can keep girls like them in town, it'll create some excitement."

Climer said the plan now is to try Anderson at outside hitter, her natural position, and see how she fares in pre-season workouts with the team.

The Lancers, who went 4-22 last fall, graduated their top offensive player (by kills) in Maggie

Goree. The second-leading hitter Charlie Lambert will be a senior and the third hitter, Kate Lingscheit, will be a junior.

When it came to recruiting Anderson, Climer said she explained her passion for building a successful program.

"I think she knew the program a little bit coming in, so selling it to her was the biggest thing," said Climer, who has now added eight recruits to the 2011 season. "I told her that we're looking for change, and if you want to come aboard our train, we can do some good things here."

"From the get-go, I think she was excited."

Said Anderson, "I just fell in love with it, and I got really excited."

That excitement was something that developed for college track after Anderson talked to the Mount Marty coaches and a handful of the athletes, she said.

"I was up in the air with track, but when I talked to some of the coaches and some of the other athletes, they told me about the benefits," Anderson said. "They all said it was a blast, and was worth doing."

Anderson finished fourth in

the high jump and triple jump at Saturday's Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) meet in Watertown. At last year's state track meet, she finished third in the high jump and seventh in the triple jump.

She boasts bests this season of 5-foot-2 in the high jump and 34-foot-4.25 in the triple jump.

Mount Marty track coach Randy Fischer said he plans to keep Anderson in the high jump and triple jump, and said he believes Anderson could develop into one of the top jumpers in the Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC).

"A lot of our interest was because of her great attitude," Fischer said. "She's a great individual and will make her mark in the GPAC in the jumps. We think in the course of her four years, she'll be able to become a great leader for us."

Anderson, who will be receiving a Trustee Scholarship at Mount Marty, was confident that she will be ready for competition at the next level.

"Obviously, it'll take some more training, but I'm sure the coaches will prepare me as much as they can," she said.

ended, Robinson would resume mowing his lawn and shopping for a toupee.

One night, Robinson and the Orioles faced the Twins at old Memorial Stadium. When Robinson left the field, he was replaced by a player who looked less likely to become a Hall of Fame ballplayer — a short, thick, balding player, who looked like a neighborhood butcher playing for the local slow-pitch softball team.

Then Killebrew plodded to the plate, launched a home run deep into the left-field bleachers, dropped his bat, watched the ball fly and started his slow navigation around the bases.

"Oh, he would watch the ball," Tony Oliva said. "He would hit it so far, so high, and he would stand there and watch it."

"Pitchers would throw at him, hit him, for doing that, but I never saw him react. He would just take first base like nothing happened."

I did not grow up in Minnesota following Killebrew, but I know what it is like to have given my young heart to a great ballplayer when baseball was king, when we erected pedestals for our favorite ballplayers and left them there for eternity.

While it may seem inelegant

to compare deaths, I believe that it hurts us more when we lose a great baseball player than when we lose other athletes.

Great baseball players, especially in Killebrew's prime, were not occasional visitors to our homes. They were uncles, cousins, friends.

They were there every day in the morning paper. They were there, on television, more often than any other athletes. They were the people you followed late at night, with a transistor radio tucked under your pillow, turned down just far enough that your parents could pretend you were sleeping.

Someday another player may replace Killebrew as the greatest Twin of all time. It is unlikely that another player will ever become so universally beloved and admired.

We called him "the Killer," but

that nickname matched the man only when a fastball was headed toward home plate. In life, he was the most gracious of the all-time greats, the most likely to leave someone he just met feeling privileged to shake his hand.

Jeff Idelson, the president of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum, once told me that the two Hall of Famers who most enthusiastically embraced their roles as icons, and most enthusiastically embraced the public, were Robinson ... and Killebrew.

I was lucky enough to see them play the same position in the same game. I was lucky enough to meet both, to confirm Idelson's assessment of the men.

In life, Killebrew did us a great favor. He allowed us to believe that the ballplayers we idolized in our youth were worthy of our affection. He never let us down.
