Outlaw Book To Be Released

VALENTINE, Neb. — The book "Legends and Lore of the Outlaw Trail" will be released at the inaugural Doc Middleton Trail Ride to be held at the Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge and Government Canyon near Valentine on May 21-22. "Legends and Lore of the Outlaw Trail" features stories on outlaws, Doc Middleton, Kid Wade and others that infested the country along the Outlaw Trail in the 1800s. Other stories feature family histories and memories handed down of the association with the various outlaws. Additional stories recount scandals, murders and suspicious occurrences. It offers a fascinating look back at life in Northern Nebraska during the frontier days. To celebrate the release of the book, Marita Placek, author of the book, will be present for a book signing at the Cherry County Fairgrounds at 8 a.m. Sunday morning, May 22.
