Nebraska's Osborne Says Anderson Aides Weren't Fired

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska athletic director Tom Osborne says he's "open-minded" as he begins looking for a new baseball coach. Osborne, who fired Mike Anderson on Sunday, said on his weekly radio show Tuesday night that he would consider established head coaches and assistants from top programs and

mid-majors and young coaches on the rise. Osborne said he has not fired Anderson's assistant coaches. Some media outlets reported Sunday that Dave Bingham, Eric Newman and Curtis Ledbetter had been dismissed along with Anderson.

Colts QB Manning Has Second Neck Surgery

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Colts star quarterback Peyton Manning had neck surgery Monday in Chicago to repair a disk problem.

It's the second neck surgery since February 2010 for Manning. The previous was to repair a pinched nerve, and this operation was less invasive and less complicated, team owner Jim Irsay said Tuesday at the NFL meetings.

"He had a bulging disk," Irsay said of the four-time league MVP. "The doctors removed a part of it."

"It's usually a six-to-eight week recovery period. I think this is one you can bounce back from quickly."

The surgery was performed at Chicago's Northwestern Memorial Hospital and Manning was back at home Tuesday.

Even though the NFL has locked out its players, communication between teams and players in these cases is allowed.

Manning has started 227 consecutive games including the playoffs. His contract is up, but there is little chance Irsay will allow the 35-year-old Manning to become a free agent once a labor agreement is reached.

Mitchell Boys' Hoops Put On Probation For One Year

MITCHELL (AP) — The Mitchell boys basketball program has been put on probation for a year.

Activities Director Geoff Gross tells The Daily Republic newspaper that the penalty stems from a rule violation by longtime head coach Gary Munsen, who coached at least one Mitchell player out of season at a tournament camp in mid-April.

The state High School Activities Association handed down the discipline at its meeting last month in Pierre. It carries a \$200 fine and a letter of reprimand. Coaches will not be able to organize four team activities this summer, and the district must detail steps to ensure similar violations don't happen in the future.

The Mitchell boys team finished second at the Class AA state tournament in March.

HARTFORD — Garretson broke a first-day tie with Deuel to narrowly claim the team championship at the S.D. State Class B Boys' Golf Tournament, which concluded Tuesday at Central Valley Golf Course in Hartford.

The Dragons edged hot-shooting Parker by one stroke and was led by Derek Dillon's third-place finish at 156. Garretson and Deuel were both at 250 after Monday's opening round.

Parker shaved 22 strokes off its team score to finish at 496, two strokes ahead of Deuel (498). Howard finished third at 510, followed in the top five by South Central (521) and Kimball (533).

Howard's Cal Wiese was the individual champion after maintaining a four-stroke lead over Freeman's Arron Lickteig. Weisse led by four shots after the first round, but both golfers carded a 77 on Tuesday.

Parker had two golfers in the top 10, with Ryan Preheim fourth at 159 and Trace Jensen tied for sixth at 163.

USD Soccer Releases 2011 Schedule

VERMILLION — A nine-game Summit League slate highlights the 2011 schedule for the South Dakota women's soccer team, which released the schedule Tuesday. The Coyotes, entering their second season under the direction of Coach Mandy Green, will play eight home games as part of the 19-game 2011 campaign.

South Dakota will play an exhibition game at home against Drake on Aug. 11 before opening the regular season on Aug. 19 at North Dakota. The Coyotes' regular-season home opener is set for Aug. 28 against Nebraska-Omaha, which is beginning its transition to NCAA Division I status in 2011. South Dakota follows with a home game against Wisconsin-

Green Bay on Aug. 31 before heading to Creighton on Sept. 4 for a nonconference matchup. The Coyotes are back home on Sept. 9 against North Dakota before beginning a stretch of four straight road games, starting at Big Ten foe Iowa on Sept. 11.

The Coyotes play a neutral-site game against Boise State on Sept. 16 in Omaha, Neb., and follow with games at Wyoming (Sept. 23) and Northern Colorado (Sept. 25).

A non-conference game against Northern Iowa is part of a final three-game homestand for the Coyotes, as they entertain rivals South Dakota State and North Dakota State on Oct. 21 and Oct. 23, respectively.


"We are going to definitely miss Kaitlyn and Taylor," Sime said. "Hopefully our girls go out and play in some competitions."
