steady for the University of Nebraska, state colleges and community colleges. Nebraska also will invest \$25 million in the University of Nebraska's Innovation Campus in Lincoln, which will include a life sciences research center, a public-private office and lab, a renovated 4-H building and other amenities. Lawmakers also enacted a roads bill that will funnel roughly \$70 million a year in state sales tax revenue into construction and maintenance over a 20-year period, starting in 2013. Gov. Dave Heineman signed the bill into law despite earlier concerns about its cost and timing. Heineman signed the bill after threatening to veto an earlier version, which he said didn't go far enough. Supporters said the new law will preserve collective bargaining rights but helps cities and school districts control their budgets. "I don't think any member wanted to leave this session without accomplishing reform," Flood said. "This is an issue that doesn't sleep well. It's not going to come back next year and be any easier." Heineman and some small-government groups warned earlier in the session about attempts to abolish the commission, which was created as an arbiter when Nebraska outlawed public union strikes. Flood said the biggest issue lawmakers will likely confront when they return in January involves the state health insurance exchanges created under President Barack Obama's health care law.

Tensions flared briefly Thursday when a technical problem forced lawmakers to vote again on two redistricting bills, one of the most contentious issues of the session. Lawmakers requested the legislative redistricting bill back from the governor so it could be read aloud, as required, and approved it a second time without changes. The bill redrawing congressional districts was returned because lawmakers rejected a provision that would have activated the new districts on Friday. Without the provision, Flood said, the bill would take effect on Aug. 26 and could complicate the governor's efforts to appoint new members of a state tax commission. Heineman must appoint new members by July 1, based on congressional boundaries that will shift under the new law.

days, Finck said his family jumped at the idea of helping keep the service going at the lake. "We met with a couple of the board members of the Lake Area Ministry and they said sure we would love to have you," Finck said. "So, we have been there about seven years now." Church services will range from a low of about 50 people to as many as 300 throughout the course of the summer, Finck said, adding that the service draws from both the campgrounds and the community. "I would say that typically we have one-half to two-thirds visiting from other areas of South Dakota and other states," he said. "The rest are area people who will just use it as their summer church." Finck said the biggest out of state draws are from northwest Iowa, Sioux Falls and Nebraska. "We joke with our visitors from Northwest Iowa and say the billionaires have moved into Spirit Lake and Lake Okoboji and pushed the millionaires out," he said. The service is billed as inter-denominational so anyone from any faith will feel welcome, Finck said. "It is informal, so come as you are," he said. "It is more along the lines of a non-liturgical service. It is always very musical but tends to have more traditional hymns, with special music every week." Finck said his family's bluegrass band provides the music for the services. If it rains, there are two picnic shelters nearby that the group utilizes for their service. "We are just trying to get people aware of what we are doing and that we are making something available that is unique," Finck said. "I think the main thing is, we want people to feel comfortable. We are not going to try to sell them anything. We will preach a message out of the bible, nonsectarian. It is fun. People have a good time. Try it, you will like it. It is an amazing thing."

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery gained 18 cents to \$8.1450 a bushel; July corn added 3.25 cents to \$7.4550 a bushel; July oats rose 9 cents to \$3.78 a bushel; while July soybeans gained 7.75 cents to \$13.8475 a bushel. Beef and pork futures fell or remained flat on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle fell 0.65 cent to \$1.0457 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.50 cent to \$1.2302 a pound; July lean hogs fell 0.13 cent to 87.27 cents a pound; while July pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.2100 a pound.
