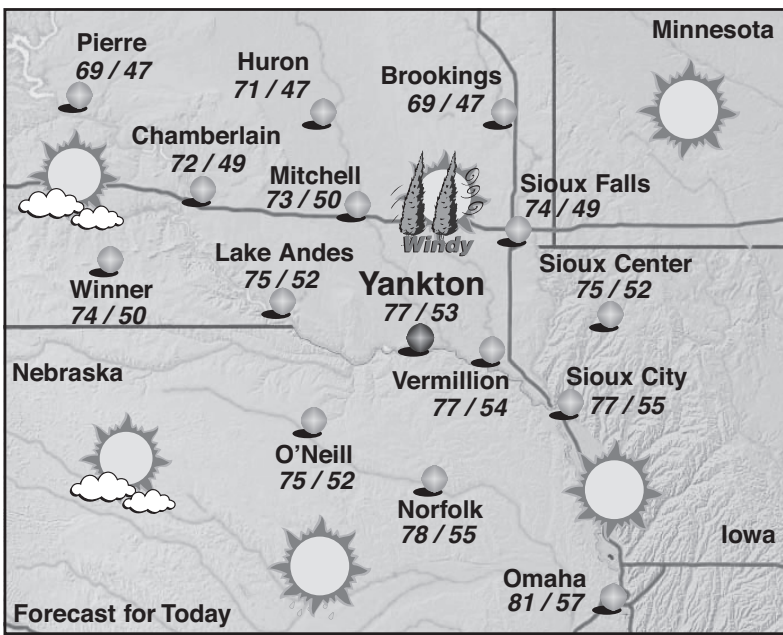

any flood-threatened area should not assume that levees will be done in time or will hold against record dam releases from Missouri River reservoirs swollen by heavy spring snowmelt and rain. New rainfall in the basin prompted the corps to accelerate planned releases from Oahe Dam. The maximum of 150,000 cubic feet per second has not changed, but releases will reach that level by June 7. Earlier projections were for June 15. Dagaard said officials still believe they should finish levees in Pierre before releases reach the maximum. Pierre Mayor Laurie Gill on Monday said 800 homes and more than 2,000 people could be affected by flooding in her city, the state's capital. "We're starting to see it in the parks system. You can see it going up over the banks, you can see it covering up bike paths," she said in an interview broadcast by

KGFX radio. "In southeast Pierre, it's ... coming up to the end of the golf course. In some of the backyards in southeast Pierre the water's coming up toward the houses."

Gill said the number of people and officials responding to help in the flood-fight efforts was "overwhelming." Among those helping are South Dakota National Guard soldiers, including some who were at annual training in Wyoming preparing for duty later this year in Afghanistan, the Rapid City Journal reported. Maj. Gen. Timothy Reisch, the state Guard commander, said that by Tuesday the Guard presence should total more than 600 soldiers. Dagaard on Monday called on all South Dakota residents to "help their neighbors." "We've had no deaths as a consequence of this flooding. What we need to do is keep that record and work hard," he said. "South Dakotans are strong, self-reliant people and we are all going to work with every fiber of our being to fight this flood."

idly changing conditions." The releases of at least 150,000 cfs are a certainty at the lower five mainstem dams, she said, and more moisture could mean that that level will have to be reached prior to June 14. "Releases could potentially go higher if conditions in the Upper Basin deteriorate," Farhat stated. The good news, according to Michael Musher of the Hydrometeorological Prediction Center, is that after Monday evening moisture should clear out of western Montana for at least several days. LOCAL OFFICIALS SCRAMBLE TO ADAPT TO CHANGING SITUATION Locally, the changing conditions have left little time for Yankton County Emergency Management Director Paul Scherschligt to rest. He said he got four hours of sleep Sunday night. However, after speaking with Lt. Gov. Matt Michels Monday morning, he may be able to rest a little easier. Prior to that meeting, Scherschligt said his office had little guidance on how high river levels may get. Michels, who is coordinating river response efforts in the Yankton-Dakota Dunes areas, brought information that flooding would be based on the 100-year flood map. "We're going to encourage citizens to start looking at their housing and infrastructure within that area," Scherschligt said early Monday afternoon. "Right now, we don't really have a good count on how

many residents that would affect." Projected inundation maps for 150,000 cfs released by the Corps Monday evening show some flooding can be expected along the shore in the residential developments between Gavins Point Dam and Yankton. However, it is not expected to be extensive. The most common question people have had is how high the water will get, according to Scherschligt. "Up until (Monday), we really didn't have an answer for them," he said. "We've been basing a lot of our stuff on the 100-year flood plain, but today we confirmed it." The uncertainty of river levels had many residents along the river scrambling to fortify their homes during the weekend with sandbags. Yankton County Emergency Management put out an urgent request for volunteers to help with sandbagging duties at the County Highway Shop, located west of Quizno's along Broadway. Yankton County has received 500,000 sandbags.

Scherchligt said they are being used as fast as they can be filled. A constant stream of vehicles could be seen along Broadway Avenue Monday afternoon as they waited to turn into the sandbagging facility. Prison inmates will be utilized throughout the week to load bags with sand, and volunteers from the public are still being sought for today (Tuesday). Laura Gulick of Yankton was one of the volunteers filling sandbags Monday afternoon. She said that her home in Yankton is not under threat. "I just wanted to help the community," Gulick stated. "Our crews are working so hard that they don't want to take a break," Scherschligt said. "We actually had to make sure they take a break every hour." He said individuals from throughout the region have been helping to fill sandbags or have been donating food to those doing the work. "We're not going to stop until everybody is safe or has the resources they need to be safe," Scherschligt said. "I can't thank people enough for coming out to help. Without their help, we'd be in trouble." Beginning today, the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce will begin preparing a list to help connect people in need with volunteers. They can be reached at (605) 665-3636. In addition, the Chamber is collecting items such as plastic totes, moving boxes, zip ties and packaging tape. RESIDENTS BELOW YANKTON PREPARE FOR HIGH WATERS Below Yankton, residents in the River Aspen neighborhood were building a levee of sandbags to protect their homes Monday and were debating whether to build an earthen levee along the shore. Jerry Pollard, who has lived in the development for nine years, said he and many other residents are evacuating the area voluntarily for other living arrangements. "I had a 25-foot drop-off (to the Missouri River). Now it is five feet," he said. "I don't want to take the

chance that things will get bad, and I won't be able to make it to home."

Friends, family and strangers from as far away as Wyoming have been in the neighborhood to help with the sandbagging efforts, Pollard said. Farther west in Riverside Acres, homeowner Gary Blom was not worried about the river level flooding his residence. However, he and others were dismantling a boat-house he had constructed last year. Blom had no plans to place sandbags around his home. "Sandbagging wouldn't help us at all," he said. Currently, Blom expects there may be flooding in his basement and encouraged others in the area to prepare for groundwater in their basements. Emergency response officials had visited with homeowners in the area, and he said they had been good about providing information. Blom and Pollard both said their communities had pulled together in the face of rising river water. "It's been amazing," Blom said. At the Gavins Point Dam, visitors from throughout the region crowded into the spillway area to get a glimpse of the releases, which have now surpassed the previous record high of 70,000 cfs set in 1997. "We haven't been up here for a while, and we've never seen it like this," said Rob Lamm of Norfolk, Neb. "It's unbelievable," said his wife, Barb.

Rising Missouri River Empties Verdel

VERDEL, Neb. (AP) — Residents of a cabin community just south of the Missouri River in northeast Nebraska have left their homes before floodwater blocks their escape. Knox County officials say Lazy River Acres between Niobrara and Verdel were evacuated on Sunday. Knox County emergency manager Laura Hintz told the *Norfolk Daily News* that Nebraska Highway 12, which runs between the two cities, could be flooded over soon.

The Army Corps of Engineers warns that flooding will likely worsen over the next month as releases from upstream reservoirs reach historic levels. Water has already spilled over the banks in several low-lying areas along the river in Nebraska and Iowa. Residents of a riverside subdivision near the northwest Iowa city of Sloan are calling for help filling sandbags.
