Options Available To S.D. First-Time Homebuyers

PIERRE — This spring is an excellent time for first-time homebuyers to start shopping for homes of their own. A new initiative by the South Dakota Housing Development Authority has helped make its First-Time Homebuyer program more competitive than ever.

Combined with SDHDA's down payment assistance and other programs, SDHDA makes it easier and less expensive than ever to finance a first-home mortgage. SDHDA is proud to be partnering with participating lenders across the state to bring first-time homebuyers a number of competitive financing options.

"We really want to make sure first-time homebuyers in South Dakota have simple, competitive, affordable mortgage options that fit their financial needs at this stage in their lives," said Brent Adney, director of Homeownership Programs for SDHDA. "If you thought homeown-

ership was out of reach, this is a good time to give our programs a second look."

Currently, SDHDA supports two types of mortgages for qualified first-time homebuyers.

- A 30-year fixed-rate mortgage. For this loan, the borrower may or may not pay discount points. If a borrower has available funds, they may choose to buy the interest rate down by paying discount points or pick a competitive interest rate with no discount points. (A discount point is an upfront payment that reduces the overall interest rate charged by the lender.)
- The Fixed-Rate Plus mortgage. This 30-year mortgage includes a gift that equals 3 percent of the loan amount. This money is used to help cover the down payment and closing costs. In addition, this loan carries no discount points.

These interest rate options allow borrowers to select the best mortgage based on the

amount of money they have saved. Many first-time homebuyers have trouble saving enough money for the upfront costs of home ownership, but their future earnings will be enough to cover the monthly payments. That's why the SDHDA has also eliminated all origination fees.

In addition, SDHDA supports services such as homebuyer education and homeownership counseling. These programs have helped thousands of South Dakotans buy homes of their own.

Using securities backed by the Government National Mortgage Association, SDHDA has been able to fund its loan programs at competitive rates. That in turn has made home loans more affordable to first-time homebuyers in South Dakota, Adney explained.

Charges Filed in Fatal Haakon County Crash

PHILIP — A Faith man was charged Thursday with vehicular homicide, vehicular battery and DUI in connection with a two-vehicle crash that killed a Pierre woman.

Walt Taton, 63, turned himself in at the Haakon County Sheriff's Office in Philip, where he was formally charged. Taton had been hospitalized after the crash, which happened on Saturday, April 28, on S.D. Highway 34 about five miles west of Hayes.

Taton was the driver of a 2004 Ford F350 pickup that collided head-on with a 2001 Dodge Caravan. A passenger in the Caravan, Heather Unser, 28, of Pierre, died in the crash. The driver of the Caravan, Sadie Clark, 21, of Yankton, received serious but non-life threatening injuries.

USD Prof To Attend MPLA Leadership Institute

VERMILLION — Danielle P. De Jager-Loftus, assistant professor at the University of South Dakota's University Libraries, has been selected to attend the Mountain Plains Library Association (MPLA) 2012 Leadership Institute, May 6-12, at Estes Park, Colo.

The Mountain Plains Library Association is a twelve state association of librarians, library para-professionals and friends of libraries in Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming. Its purpose is to promote the development of librarians and libraries by providing significant educational and networking opportunities. Funded by the Gerald M. Kline Family Foundation (Innovative Interfaces, Inc. and SkyRiver), the Institute facilitator is Maureen Sullivan, President-Elect of the American Library Association. Additional funding is by the Emporia School of Library and Information Management, the University of Arizona School of Information Resources Library Science, and MPLA.

De Jager-Loftus is Technology Librarian and liaison to departments in the College of Fine Arts. She has developed several marketing and instructional initiatives for the Libraries such as LibGuides (libguides.usd.edu); and READ (www.flickr.com/photos/usduniversitylibraries/sets/72157628045700348/). De Jager-Loftus teaches Information Literacy to USD and the extended community. Her research interests include surveys, technology in liaisonship and instruction, Website design, user interface and usability, and digital libraries. De Jager-Loftus received her M.S.L.I.S. from Florida State University, and M.F.A. from the State University of New York at Buffalo.
